## Foodbank 'forgotten' as demand increases

Since opening in mid-January the Whitchurch-Stouffville Foodbank has gone from helping 20 families per month to more than 15 per week. This increase has put a strain on the foodbank's budget.

"We need food," said foodbank co-ordinator, Robyn Magee. "The need is going up but people are forgetting us."

In hopes of raising money, the Markham and Stouffville foodbanks along with McDonald's Restaurants, have organized McStouffville Day for May 11, 1991.

From 11 a.m. to 8 p.m., \$1 from the sale of every Big Mac at the Highway 48 and 16 Avenue McDonald's Restaurant will be donated to the Whitchurch-Stouffville Foodbank. The money raised will be deposited in an account with local grocery stores for use by the food bank.

"Notoriously, food banks run dry in the summer months," said Janet Peters, a McDonald's Restaurant customer relations representative. "With the greater demand this year we hope to prevent this from occurring."

Magee stressed that collecting food is an ongoing concern. Fresh fruit and vegetables, and canned meat or fish are always needed.

Food can be donated at foodbank bins located at the I.G.A., A&P, and the Care and Share Shoppe. Magee hopes to see shoppers purchase one food item for donation each time they shop.
