School responds to Spicer Commission

Sullivan said she feels it's an excellent idea to discuss such issues with younger children, because they have a remarkable ability to get to the heart of things. "I really think we underestimate our kids."

Probably the biggest difference for the kids is wearing coats and boots."

Glenn attends Ballantrae Public School and Karen is at Stouffville District Secondary School and both have settled in well, said Lois.

The exchange was arranged through the education department in Sydney and the York Region Board of Education. "It's a really good way of travelling. Instead of being a tourist for three weeks, you're actually living in a place and experiencing all the different seasons. We love watching the leaves come out on the trees and seeing the changes which take place every day."

Recreation update
Registration for this year's aquatic programs has been booming this year, with



500 kids already signed up. "We're getting things done faster," said recreation programmer Peter Arnott. "We had 380 kids register on Monday night in four and a half hours. Last year it took six hours to process 297." There's also been an excellent response to the roller blade program which starts May 30, he noted.

The drop-in program runs from 5 to 7 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays and participants can bring skates or rent them at the complex. Helmets and elbow pads are mandatory. Residents are reminded that there will be a barbecue lunch in the park on sneaker day, Friday, May 24, and anyone who is wearing sneakers is eligible to attend.
