

Daughter's wish turns Stouffville dad into top triathlete

When Megan Derry tearfully confronted her father with his 50-cigarette-a-day habit a few years ago, the frightened youngster had no idea she was initiating a chain of events that would see her dad winging his way to Gold Coast Australia to compete in the 1991 Triathlon World Championships next month.

But that's exactly what Dave Derry is about to do, as the freelance film industry key grip tunes his body for the gruelling ordeal that awaits down under.

Dave, who resides on the Bethesda Sideroad just west of Stouffville, qualified to make the trip as part of the Triathlon Canada national team when he finished 11th in the recent Muskoka Triathlon.

The Muskoka swim-cycle-run event was the culmination of a summer spent chasing down just about every triathlon held in southern Ontario.

Dave won his age group in this year's Stouffville Strawberry Festival Triathlon in July, and he placed second in competitions at Niagara-on-the-Lake and Guelph.

He finished third in the Toronto World Cup affair in Milton, and logged a third at a Peterborough race as well.

The father of three will be the first to admit he's come a long way since entering his first triathlon. After granting daughter Megan's all consuming Christmas wish that he quit smoking in 1989, Dave took up jogging to help him appreciate his rediscovery of fresh, smoke-free air.

He had promised his daughter he would chuck the butts the year before, in the spring. Then fall became the target date as the pledge kept going unfulfilled.

"Then my daughter got upset," remembers Dave. "She came up to me and told me, 'You're going to die.'"

That was good enough for Dad. He swore off cigarettes immediately.

But the demon weed had taken its toll, and his participation in his first triathlon, the Strawberry Festival Triathlon in the summer of 1990, was a less than awesome athletic display.

In fact, Dave recalls it as a lamentable ordeal at best. "I almost died," he now concedes.

"I hit the water in my boxer style bathing suit, and the water was freezing. All I knew how to do was the backstroke. I did the bicycle part on a mountain bike, and all I remember was that people were going past me like rockets."

"I was staggering at the transition point. In the end, I was just surviving, not competing."

But that was last year.

After his initial experience, Dave proceeded to go out and buy a proper bike, then began training nightly at the York University facility until he started to develop some stamina.

He started entering more triathlons as his conditioning came along, and the rest, you might say, is history.

Now that he's made the national team, his main concern evolves around just how he's going to pay his way to the land of the kangaroo and Crocodile Dundee.

He's responsible for his own airfare, accommodation, and food, as well as other incidental expenses. And he's hoping he just might stumble across a sponsor looking for a little international exposure.

Once he gets there, he's in for the triathlon of a lifetime. The proposed course runs through the centre of Surfer's Paradise, about 80 kilometres from Brisbane.

The 1.5 kilometre swim will be in the Gold Coast Broadwater, a stretch of tidal saltwater just

behind the coastal strip. The 40 km bike course will encircle the Indy Grand Prix course, with the Pacific on one side and the highrise hotels and condos on the other.

A 10 km run finishes it off.

Good luck, Dave. And don't for-

get to bring home a little something for Megan.

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
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
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
