Plaque honors historic Creamery

The old Stouffville Creamery was honored Friday night with the official unveiling of an historical plaque.

The plaque has been placed outside the door of the Stouffville Fitness Resort, which is located on the site of the Creamery, which burned down in June of 1989.

Dignitaries including Durham-York MPP Larry O'Connor were on hand for the unveiling of the plaque.

It was a joint effort of the Whitchurch-Stouffville Historical Society, the Fitness Resort, and

the Ontario Ministry of Culture and Recreation.

Several descendants of the first board of directors of the Creamery were also in attendance.

The business, which was first opened in the

1890s, was operated by the Borinsky family from 1918 until the middle of the century, when Fred Crossen purchased it.

Irvin Borins, a descendant of the Borinsky family, was also present.

Refreshments were served after the ceremony, with those in attendance being given the opportunity to view items pertaining to the former businesses which were run through the years on the site of the Creamery.

An Open Letter to All Canadians.



Tuesday, September 24, 1991

My fellow Canadians:

Today in the House of Commons, the Prime Minister is putting forward proposals to renew the Canadian federation.

The proposals are not fixed or final. They are a basis for discussion. Canadians are encouraged to debate them vigorously and openly and suggest how they can be improved so that every Canadian can feel welcome, understood and respected in our own land.

A Special Joint Committee of the House of Commons and Senate will seek the views of Canadians on these proposals. Please participate actively in the Committee's work. It's an opportunity to forge the kind of Canada that can best serve the interests of Canadians now and in the future.

The process of renewing the Canadian partnership will not be easy. Canada was born and built because previous generations understood that unity is the key to prosperity and that the keys to unity are tolerance, compromise and goodwill.

In difficult times, these characteristics are often in short supply but that is when we need them most.

Canadians have the opportunity as never before to create a Canada in which all Canadians can feel at home. Together, we have the opportunity to strengthen this country to make it more prosperous and more responsive to the aspirations of all its people.

I urge you to take part in renewing Canada. It's our country that's at stake.

1991 YARD WASTE/LEAF COLLECTION

The Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville will commence this fall with a residential yard waste/leaf collection for the entire Town. Collection will take place on your regularly scheduled waste collection day during the following weeks:

- Week of October 7th to 11th, 1991
- Week of November 4th to 8th, 1991
- Week of December 2nd to 6th, 1991

Leaves, hedge or shrub trimmings, weeds, plants and flowers, placed in CLEAR PLASTIC BAGS may be put at the curbside by 7:00 a.m. for collection. Branches and brush under 2 inches in diameter, bundled and tied in four foot lengths, may also be included. Residents are encouraged to compost their yard waste and leaves. Composters are available through the Town. Please remember that green and orange garbage bags should be used for waste collection and clear bags for yard waste and leaves. Residents who are unable to utilize the Town collection may dispose of yard waste Monday to Friday 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and on Saturdays from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the Regional Compost Site on Bloomington Road at Leslie Street.
