I liked working in the workshop there and seeing the sights and the people. It's not a clean place. They don't take care of it, and the cars are very different. They often carry 30 or 40 people in the back of a pickup truck. There are no shopping malls, and most of the stores carry imported goods, he noted. "They only have two major television channels and we could only get one. It was only on at night." He was fascinated by the native peoples and how they dressed. "Some dress very colorfully, most of them wear just a towel or a blanket," he observed. "The people there are very friendly." During his stay he took a number of trips, visiting Mombasa, Nairobi and Turkna.
