The Bruins, under the direction of new coach Bud Bower, are hoping a combination of veterans and rookies will help erase memories of last year's sub-par showing.

The new-look Bruins will be without long time star centre Greg Cook, who ran out of options after playing the 1991-92 season as an over aged Junior.

Also gone are all star defenceman Darron Baston and talented forward Ted Dacey, both of whom cited other commitments as the reason for stepping down.

Returning veterans include bruising rearguard Jamie Showers and rugged forward Chris Winn, both of whom are playing as overaged Juniors.

Also back are four members of the Bruins' Stouffville connection, all star centre Jason Underwood, forward Dan McNeil, and defenceman Jay Hause.

Forward Craig Stewart is

back as well.

Among the collection of promising rookies are former Uxbridge Midget standouts Aaron Morrison and Ryan Wilkinson.

Jeff Reid, a former Oshawa Legionaire Junior B goal keeper, has a lock on a position, provided he can get his release from Oshawa.

Three other former Legionaires are also awaiting their

releases so they can officially join the Bruins.

Team general manager Chuck Phillips said Wednesday the team might take a little while to gel, but that he was optimistic.

"We've had a good training camp," he said. "We've given everyone a good long look. I think by the time we get things together we should be okay. We should have some good young

players to go with our veterans."

Bower, who had watched from the stands as the Bruins lost their first two exhibition games, took over the controls as the team triumphed twice last week. The Uxbridge squad edged the defending league champion Port Perry Mojacks 4-3 Sept. 22, then downed Bowmanville 5-2 in Uxbridge the next night.
