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York passes stiff anti-smoking bans

□ York smokers may find it difficult to light up after four tough regulations were approved last week.

Smokers in York Region may be banned from lighting up anywhere in public after officials supported some tough regulations last week.

One of the restrictions - geared at preventing teens from becoming hooked on the weed - will make it nearly impossible for minors to buy cigarettes in the region.

York's Community Services and Health Committee submitted four strict anti-smoking bans, which officials "surprisingly" adopted. York council is comprised largely of non-smokers - only four of the 20-member council smokes.

York's Medical Officer of Health, Helena Jaczek said after the meeting that she was "astounded," but extremely pleased by council's decision to back the strict regulations.

Jaczek added, however, that council's support doesn't mean the anti-smoking bans will be implemented. York can only approve the recommendations, and press its nine area municipalities to pass the necessary bylaws.

Council's decision to overwhelmingly support a region wide smoking ban could have been swayed by a citizen's impassioned plea to do so.

Keswick woman Maxine Share-Strom began to sob uncontrollably while explaining that second-hand smoke nearly killed her

17 years ago, and is harming her four children.

Share-Strom's two daughters held up large signs, emblazoned with the words "Your Freedom - What about my Asthma?" and "Adults Should Know Better."

Region slams Ontario Hydro growth plans

Ontario Hydro will have to clean up its act before building more transformer stations in York Region.

Barton Sala, hydro's community relations officer, said Ontario Hydro is in the midst of an environmental assessment study that would see two

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
Meeting on referendum
