The graduating class 1992 will also be thinking of Jeff Cowley known to most of his friends as "Frito." Heads may drop to hope and pray for him with all their hearts.

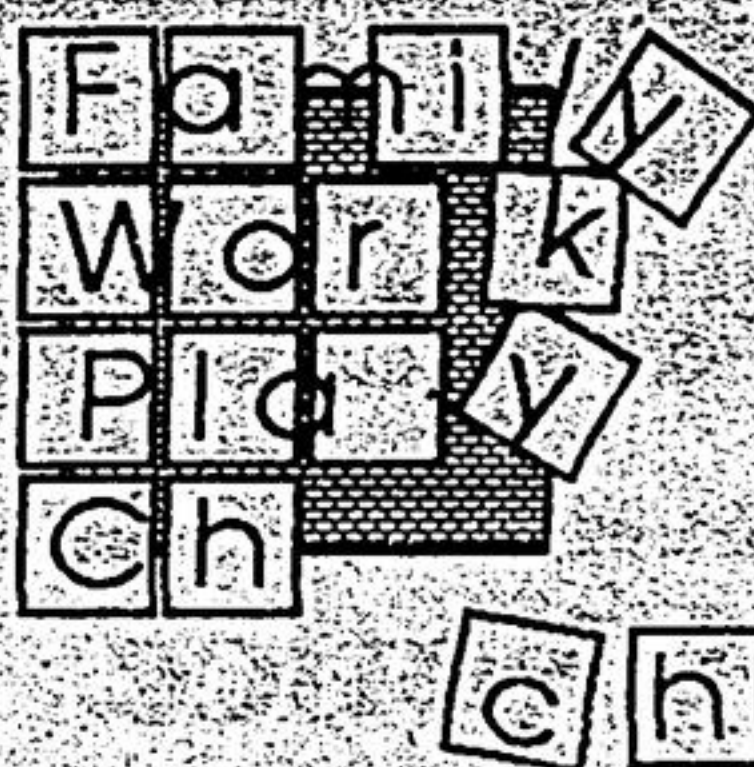
Graduates of Commencement '92 will be wearing white ribbons for Jeff which will signify hope and purity for a new beginning and speedy recovery.

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CANADA'S FIREARMS AMNESTY

November 1 to 30, 1992

Think gun safety. Make it count. The new firearms control law gives everyone the chance to turn in unwanted or illegal guns and register restricted weapons without fear of prosecution for possession offences during the amnesty. The amnesty means you can also dispose of any prohibited weapons, explosives or ammunition.

Too often, forgotten or neglected guns can lead to a tragedy.

The amnesty is an ideal opportunity to get rid of weapons you no longer want.

Taking advantage of the amnesty is easy. Simply unload the gun and turn it over to your local police.

If there is the slightest risk or if you have any questions, call your local police.

Make it happen for the safety of you and your family.

TOWN OF WHITCHURCH-STOUFFVILLE

FALL ORGANIC YARD WASTE COLLECTION

The Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville will provide special collections of organic yard waste on the regularly scheduled waste collection days during the following week:

Week of November 16th to November 20th

Yard waste must be placed at the curb by 7:00 a.m. in **CLEAR PLASTIC BAGS** or tied in bundles having dimensions not greater than four feet long and one foot in diameter and weighing not more than fifty (50) pounds. Branches must not be more than six inches in diameter.

Residents are requested to compost much of their yard waste or assist by taking measures to reduce the amount of yard waste.

Residents should not let their grass get too tall before cutting it. Grass clippings, less than one inch (25 mm) long, can be left on the lawn to fertilize the soil. In addition, grass and leaves can be mulched and placed around shrubs and plants to hold in moisture and deter weed growth.

Residents who have large quantities of yard waste or who do not wish to keep their yard waste until the next collection day, may take this material to the York Region's Composting Facility. This facility is located on the south side of Bloomington Road, just west of Leslie Street and is open 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Monday through Saturday, from April 1st to December 31st, excluding statutory holidays.

For details on future yard waste collections, residents are requested to check their local newspapers for advertisements.
