From Go-kart track to the Indy 500

When Mario Petti, his wife, Nicolina, and their son, Mario, Jr., gathered around the TV on Sunday to watch the Cleveland Grand Prix, they shared a special interest in the proceedings.

After all, two of the leading contenders in the race began their careers just 40 yards from where the Pettis were sitting.

The Pettis own and run Goodwood Kartways, a go-kart track which snakes and weaves its way over an acre of land outside the Pettis' front door. It doesn't look like the nurturing grounds for world-class auto racers, tucked neatly but inconspicuously in a corner where two country roads intersect several kilometres northeast of Stouffville.

But Goodwood Kartways was the early proving grounds for such track notables as Scott Goodyear and the whiz kid Paul Tracy. Both of these big-money winners started burning rubber at Goodwood while only nine years old. Scott in 1970 and Paul in 1977.

The go-kart track was originally built and operated by Gene Bell in 1957. He retired at the age of 97 and sold the operation to Mario Petti, an Oshawa garage owner and go-kart enthusiast, in 1975.

Manoeuvring the course's many twists and turns requires considerable strength and stamina of both children and adults, as well as quick reflexes and a cool head. The go-karts can move at speeds up to 160 kilometres an hour.

"It's almost impossible to tip them," Mario, Sr., points out when questioned about the safety of the sport.

"The go-kart's body is only an inch off the asphalt and they're wide. Nobody's been seriously injured here. Maybe some scrapes and bruises from time to time, but nothing serious," he reiterates. "One fellow did break his leg once but that's the worst injury we ever had here."

Kids start as early as eight years old at Goodwood. There are three categories of drivers.

First, there's the Rookies, and you're considered a rookie at any age until you've proven yourself in competitions, which are held every second Sunday. Only after winning several races do you move up to Junior ranking. The final stage is Senior, and you have to be good to make it.

Scott Goodyear, who as a boy worked after school in his father's motorcycle and snowmobile shop on Yonge St. heard lots of heady

conversation about auto racing. He found his way to Goodwood in 1969. With his father's backing, he spent as much time on the track as he could until he went to racing school at Mosport in 1978.

Paul Tracy, too, fell in love with Goodwood. He and Mario, Jr., became fast friends during Paul's years at the go-kart track.


"Paul sometimes even slept overnight here," Mario Sr., recalls with a smile.

It's easy to see that the older Mario is proud of the achievements of these two drivers who have joined the world's racing elite.

"They're both good drivers, but different. Paul is aggressive. If he has a two-lap lead, he wants to make it four. It's always push for more."

Finding it hard to put Scott's driving into words, he finally said, "Scott is maybe more patient. He moves around the track and passes other cars, nice, smooth..."

And if auto races are never certain, one thing is: the Pettis will be sitting before the television on Sunday, watching the Molson Indy 500 and pulling for the two Canadian drivers. Then they'll be back to business, watching over the track and the possible future greats now testing themselves against its many sharp turns.


