

Stouffville runner Robbins competes in Toronto race

Stouffville's Fred Robbins finished 43rd out of a field of 3,600 runners at the Coors Light One Half Marathon in Toronto Oct. 3.

Robbins completed the 21-kilometre course through the streets of downtown Toronto in one hour, 14 minutes, and 28 seconds.

The runner attributed his strong performance to pacing himself with another strong

runner.

"I was able to run with Dr. John DeFinney, who had beat me in the 5 km in Unionville earlier this year," he said.

"I felt good and needed the focus."

Stouffville's Dan Rivers was 851st, Jim Lyons was 1,212th, and David Baxter 1,960th.

Stouffville's Dave Reed placed ninth out of 210 fin-

ishers at the Bochi 8K race in Unionville the same day. Reed clocked in at 26:18, and was beaten out by some of the top runners in Ontario.

Stouffville's Larry Fockler was 18th with a time of 29:11, while Ken Felschuk, another local resident, was 45th at 33:30.

The race raised \$12,000 for Camp Oochi, a camp for children with cancer.

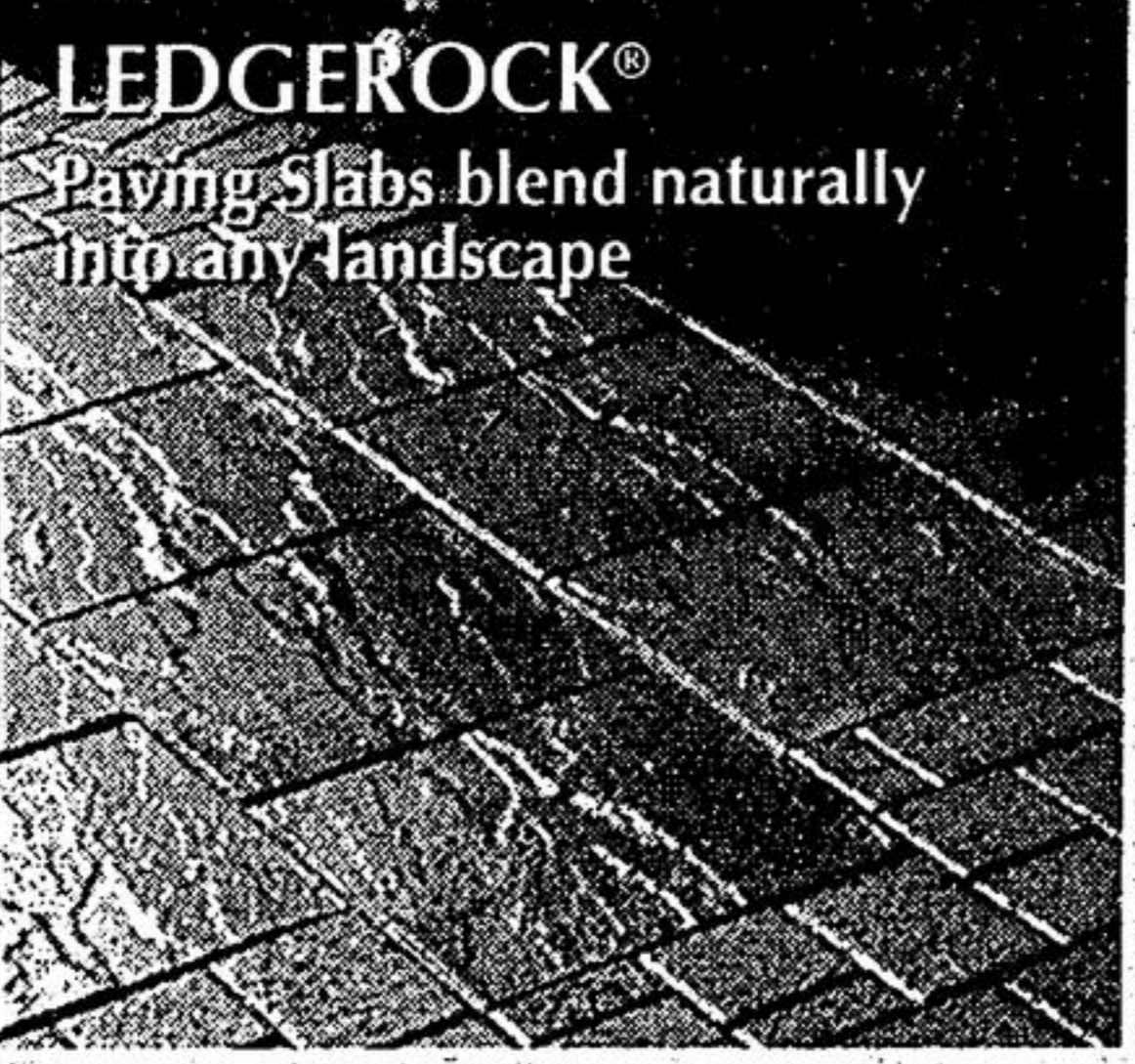

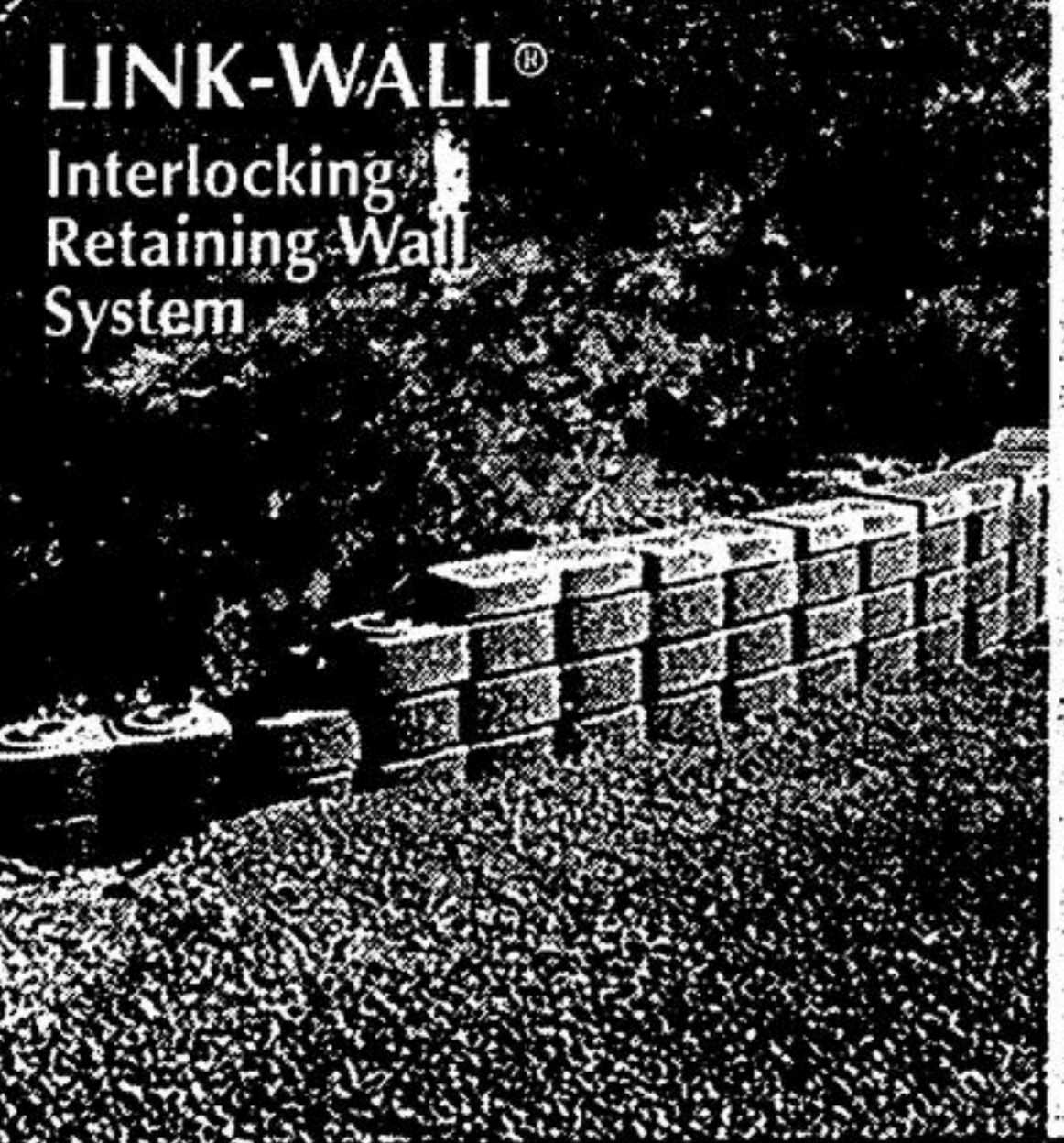

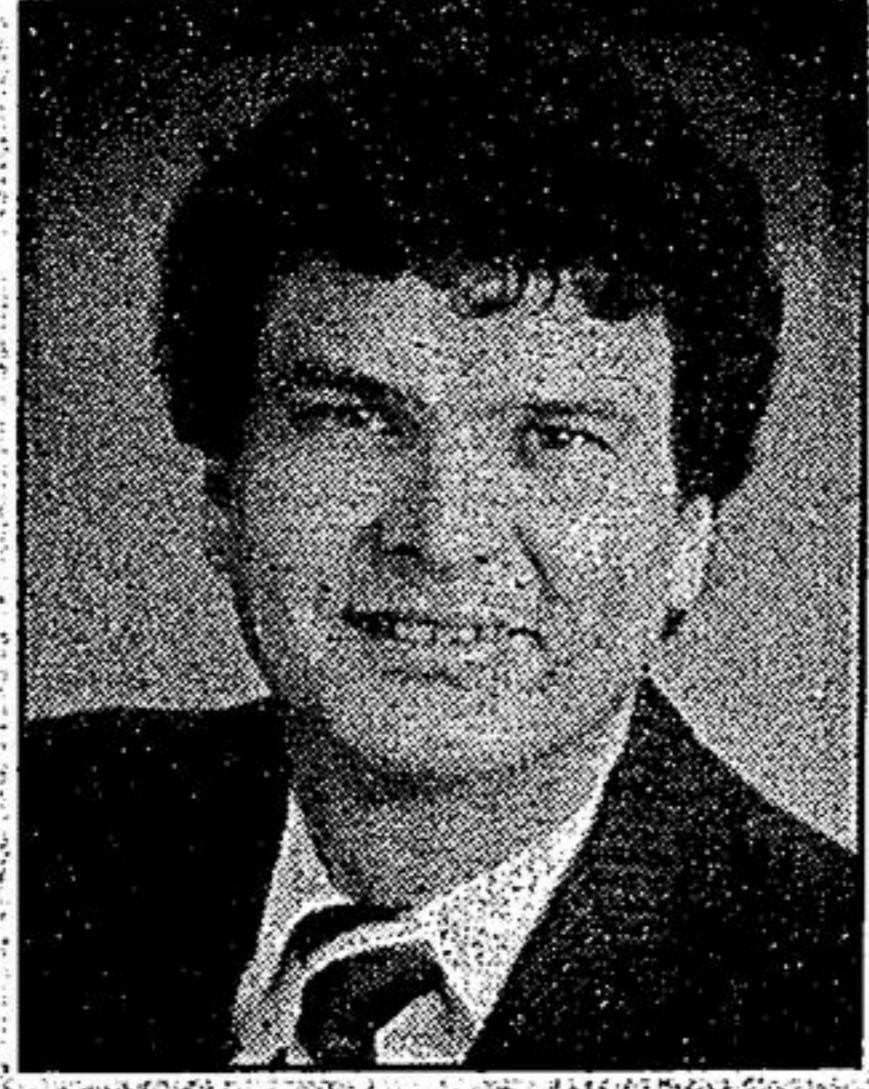
