ponent of a much larger issue called "standards". Almost daily I read in our metropolitan press articles, editorials and letters to the editor that scream out loudly the public demand for standards in our schools - primarily of course in the curriculum we present but also quite clearly in the expecta-

tions that we should have for students outside the academic sphere.

At Ballantrae Public School, we have developed and are constantly considering consistent standards in our classroom programs. We collectively believe that basic skills, knowledge and attitudes are the foundation on which education is built. In addition, we believe in other standards which contribute to a positive atmosphere for learning. We are committed to the belief that all students and staff deserve to receive

encouragement and support in a healthy, safe and caring environment. "Please" and "Thank you" are still in style at Ballantrae Public School. We have a code of behavior that sets out expectations and a process of learning from mistakes for all students. Presently, we are creating a policy on involvement in extracurricular activities that will have direct expectations for students, staff and parents alike.

While we certainly are not advocating school uniforms at Ballantrae, we do have standards of a

dress code that are fair and appropriate. The students attend Ballantrae Public School first of all to learn. We try to minimize any distractions to our key function.

The issue of British Union Made clothing is one of standards - no more, no less. At Ballantrae Public School we listen to the concerns of our community and society at large. There is no question of their demand for standards. We happen to agree.
