

Country festival at Markham Fairgrounds in May

LINE DANCE COUNTRY FESTIVAL Stouffville residents Bunny Burton and Angela Tucker, director of the York Region School of Dance, are jointly presenting the first ever Line Dance Country Festival at Markham Fairgrounds on Saturday, May 28.

The day-long event includes workshops on square dancing, folk dancing, clogging, line dancing and country line dancing.

Among the featured experts will be Diane Horner, whose series of line dance instructional videos have established her as a leader in the field.

Vendors will be on site throughout the day, offering the latest fashions and accessories for country and line dancing aficionados.

During the evening there will be dance demonstrations and a delicious barbecue, provided by Occasions Catering, after which participants can dance the night away to music by Footloose Roadhouse. Full-day tickets, including the evening dance, are \$45 each.

For the workshop and day events only the cost is \$20 per person.

CBMI BILINGUAL TOUR

Last Sunday, the Christian Blind Mission launched its first bilingual tour, entitled Une Histoire à Raconter/A story to Tell.

"After years of meeting and ministering to English-speaking friends of the mission, I am thrilled that we are finally able to give something back to our francophone friends, many who have been such faithful supporters," commented Art Brook-

er, national director of CBMI from the Canadian office on Stouffville Road.

Two young men from the French-speaking nation of Zaire, Ngoy Kalumbi and Kalombo Paskal, will be travelling with the tour, which will take them through southern Ontario and Quebec.

The Ontario portion will include Beaverton, Unionville, Willowdale, Toronto and Burlington. Kalumbi works at CBMI's rehabilitation centre in Kinshasa, the capital city of Zaire.

Paskal, blind from the age of 16, is testimony to the work done by the organization.

Through the love and practical help of a missionary and the CBMI-supported school for blind students in Kinshasa, he was spared a life of total isolation and desperate poverty, and was given a chance to start a new life.

Paskal now supports himself by teaching other blind people to read braille and he is looking forward to sharing his story of hope with Canadians during his tour.
