

Spartans cage first win

Jason Cowan's layup basket with just seconds left in the game gave the Stouffville District Secondary School Spartan senior boys' basketball team a dramatic 60-58 comeback victory over Newmarket H.S. in York Region Secondary School Athletic Association action last week.

The win, which saw the Spartans bounce back after trailing by 22 points going into the second half, was the first of the season after 11 losses.

"We came on like gangbusters," enthused Spartans' co-coach Jim Fletcher. "After the first half Mackie (co-coach Bill McKnight) and I told the boys they can't quit, that we thought we could run these guys into the ground. And we ran right by them."

The Spartans resorted to a man to man defence in the second half as they began to narrow the gap. Key steals by Brian Snooks and Jermain Franklin enabled the SDSS outfit to tie the score at 58 a piece with less

than a minute to play.

Cowan, who had been removed late in the game because of foul trouble, came back in time to strip the ball at mid court with six seconds remaining. He then drove to the hoop and sunk the game winner.

Fletcher heaped praise on his players, saying it was a genuine team effort. "Don Patten kept the team alive when Cowan ran into foul trouble, and Kevin Barbe made an incredible sky hook. Snooks, Franklin, and Cowan applied tremendous pressure on defence, and Steve Emes was great on defence and had eight rebounds."

Snooks led the Spartans points parade with 17. Barbe contributed 14 points, all in the second half, while picking off several key rebounds. Cowan, Emes, and Franklin had 10 points each.

The Spartans were to finish out the regular season with a home game against Markville S.S. Monday.

Spartan juniors hoop it up in overtime; midgets downed

The Stouffville District Secondary School junior boys' basketball team came up big in overtime in a tripleheader with visiting Newmarket H.S. in York Region Secondary School Athletic Association action last week.

But for the school's midget squad, it was a matter of having all systems shut down in the fourth quarter.

The junior Spartans, led by the outstanding play of Jason Reesor and the timely scoring of Steve U'Ren, prevailed 59-56 in a contest that required an extra period to decide. Reesor poured in 15 points, including eight points from the free throw line in the fourth quarter to keep his team in the game.

Reesor also hauled down nine rebounds, earned three steals, and a

trio of blocked shots to his credit.

U'Ren caught fire in overtime, going for the hoop for eight points to give the Spartans their biggest win of the season.

The midget Spartans trailed by a slim 30-29 margin going into the final quarter.

But they were over run by their Newmarket opponents in the late going, losing 61-36.

Spartans head coach Andy Cherkas said his team was as cold as Newmarket was hot in the game's final minutes.

"They (Newmarket) started hitting their shots and we started fouling," said Cherkas.

"They weren't missing, and we went cold, we panicked. Everything that could possibly go wrong did."

Paul Koert led the Spartan scoring

with 10 points. Jay Hoover had six points, while Chris Karram, James Bowen, and Craig Wood chipped in with five, four, and three points respectively.

The junior and midget Spartans were to close out the regular season schedule with contests against Markville S.S. at home on Monday.
