Schell peewees lose heartbreaker

The Schell Lumber peewee Clippers Selects came within eight seconds of a berth in the championship game at their own tournament Wednesday at the Rec Centre.

The Clippers, who drubbed the Toronto Hawks 11-3 in their opener, dropped a 4-3 overtime decision to Ajax in a highly charged, physical semi-final contest.

The Stouffville squad nursed a 3-2 lead well into the third period, and appeared to have a lock on the game when Ajax ran into penalty problems in the last few minutes of regulation time.

But a quick break resulted in Ajax scoring the equalizer on a short handed effort with just eight seconds remaining.

It was the Clippers turn to be victimized by an untimely infraction in overtime as Ajax netted the winner on a power play in the second two minute extra session. With tournament overtime rules calling for each team to ice only three skaters in the second overtime period, the

Clippers were forced to go with two players up front compared with three for Ajax.

Thomas Hawkins, Bryant Hulshoff, and Brandon Crossen scored for the Clippers.

Clippers coach Terry Weatherill praised his team's efforts in the closely fought contest. "It was a high calibre of play, it was definitely championship level hockey," said Weatherill. "The boys did everything we asked them to do. They conducted themselves well in a tough defeat that could as easily been a victory."

Hulshoff netted a hat trick in the Clippers opener against the Hawks. Colin Thompson and Crossen each chipped in with a pair of goals, while singles came from Reuben Cannard, Nigel Griffin, Hawkins, and Brett Boyd. Shane Cody had two assists.

Ajax defeated Brooklin/Whitby 3-1 in the A final game. Appplewood edged the Hawks 5-4 in the consolation final.
