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

Pastors learn to combat racism at CBMI

Fifty-three chaplains from Orillia to Toronto were briefed this week on the subjects of racism and religious prejudice at a training session held at the Christian Blind Mission International (CBMI) in Stouffville.

The chaplains, most of whom work in provincially-operated seniors' residences, homes for the developmentally handicapped, and correctional institutions, were instructed on how to handle problems arising out of Canada's ever-increasing racial and religious mix.

Five sessions

The session is one of five of its kind to be put on in Southern Ontario this year by the Canadian Centre for Social Justice (CCSJ), a private, non-profit body which deals with race relations.

Dr. Gary Gould, president of the CCSJ, was the principal speaker at the Stouffville session.

According to Don Currie, who is vice-president of the CCSJ Human Rights and Race Relations program, the program's goal is to help the chaplains become more effective in performing their duties and in the training of volunteers.

Strategies

"The main objective is to give the chaplains the strategies and tools to deal with the racial and religious diversities in their own institutions," Currie said.

"We want to equip them for leadership, and for cross-cultural counselling."

Rev. Lynda Kelly, regional co-ordinator for Chaplains Services for the Georgian Bay-Toronto region, said it was also essential for the chaplains to be aware of their own prejudices.

Aware

"From a chaplain's perspective, we are aware of the differences in race, religion, and culture," said Rev. Kelly, who arranged the CBMI session.

"But we're not always aware of how our own race, culture and religion biases our view."

The session was sponsored by Chaplaincy Services for Ontario, which acts as the co-ordinator for the 200 chaplains across the province.
