Creativity focus of Education Week activities

Learning and student creativity are the focus of events at St. Mark School during Education Week.

A variety of activities will take place, including a display of drawings and paintings by students at Latcham Gallery and the recreation centre; a book fair; visits by author Barbara Greenwood; the Young Author Conference for junior grades and a performance by the school choir on May 5.

That evening, Tony Burton, a behavioral resource consultant, will speak at the school. At the Young Author Conference on May 5, Dan Yashinsky, from Mariposa in the Schools, will tell stories, sing and play guitar.

Students will take part in one of 20 workshops, where they can participate in various

activities, including making fancy bookmarks and learning how to sculpt plasticine to illustrate books.

The workshops will be led by school staff and parent volunteers.

In the afternoon, about 150 students will read the books

they have written and edited themselves to small groups of their peers.

The books have all been published by St. Mark School's Publishing Room.

The facility is presently working on its 300th book and the conference is a highlight of

Education Week activities at the school.

Obituary

J. Borinsky owned local creamery

When Jacob Borinsky passed away on April 17 at the age of 95, a little bit of Stouffville history died with him.

Mr. Borinsky came to Canada from Russia 82 years ago, attending school in Toronto for one day before landing a job as a barber.

In 1918, he and his father Isaac took over the then-defunct Stouffville Creamery, which had originally been founded by local farmers and merchants in the early 1890s.

The Borinskys remodelled the facility and re-opened it. In 1920, Jacob Borinsky struck out on his own, building and operating the Mount Albert Creamery.

He and his family later moved to the States, but he returned to Canada in 1928 and set up a store in Toronto where he sold dairy products.

Mr. Borinsky went on to become an extremely successful businessman.

Those who were close to him remember him as a loyal and caring friend, who never lost sight of his humble beginnings.

Fanny, his wife of 53 years, predeceased him in 1971.

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
