

Good start for softball Spartans

The Stouffville District Secondary School (SDSS) Spartans boys softball team started off the season with a pair of impressive victories last week. The Spartans rode an eight-run second inning to a 13-1 win over Bradford S.S. in their opener Monday. On Friday, the Spartans got solid pitching from Jody Infurnari and

rookie Paul Koert on route to a 7-4 triumph over Dr. G.W. Williams S.S. (Aurora) in a game played at the town park. While the Spartans dominated Monday's game, Friday's match saw them get off to a slow start as a misjudged fly ball on the first pitch of the game led to a Williams' run. But the Spartans defence was sharp in turning a delayed double

play to prevent further damage. The Spartans chipped away for two runs in their half of the inning, after which time SDSS starting pitcher Infurnari settled down to keep the Williams' batters in check until Koert took over the fifth inning. Shortstop Jason Reesor and third baseman Ryan Burkholder each scored a pair of runs against


Bantams return; post win in first exhibition match

The Bantams are back! After a one year hiatus, Stouffville once again has a bantam boys' rep softball team. Brad Hackert collected a pair of safeties in his two trips to the plate, while Norm Davis scored twice on a hit and two walks. The Bantam roster includes 1992 pee wee players Scott Assinck, Evan Boyd, Adam Crowder, Davis, Koert, and Smart. Brad Hackert, Tommy Hammond, and Shawn Sargent have returned after a stint with the town's hardball program. Underwood played in Port Perry last season. VanKoughnet and Sumit Rouss played house league ball last year. The team begins the regular season this week, with the home opener set for the town park Thursday night at 8:30 p.m. at the main diamond. The squad will play in its first tournament of the season May 29 in Guelph.

Sinclair selected as Bruins' new Stouffville contact

As part of a move to beef up the team's local content, the Uxbridge Bruins have named Paul Sinclair their Stouffville contact. Tim Lavell just can't get enough volleyball. The Stouffville District Secondary School OAC student started with the Senior Spartans team that won the York and Durham-York (DYSSAA) high school crowns last fall, then played a key part in that squad's victory in the Consolation championship match up at the provincial (OFSAA) tournament in Alliston in November.

Then it was back to Switzerland over the Christmas holidays, as he revisited the land he had stayed for a year as an exchange student for the 1991-92 school year. Tim had played some semi-pro volleyball while studying in Switzerland, and went back with fellow Spartan Brian Snooks to check into the possibility of playing with a Swiss Division B outfit next year. Tim hopes to attend the University of Geneva next fall.

Last Tuesday found Tim making a presentation to council regarding his idea to form a beach volleyball club here in town.
