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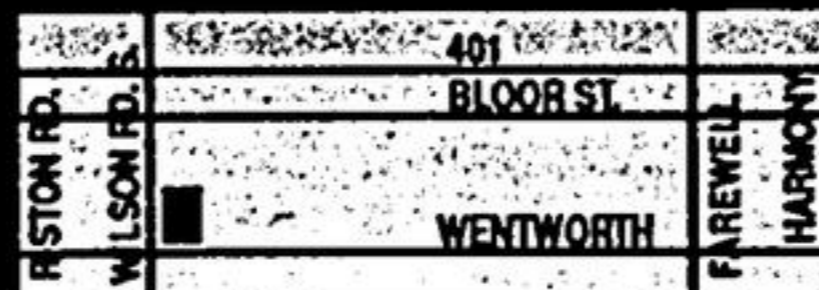

## YORK REGION'S COMPOSTING FACILITY

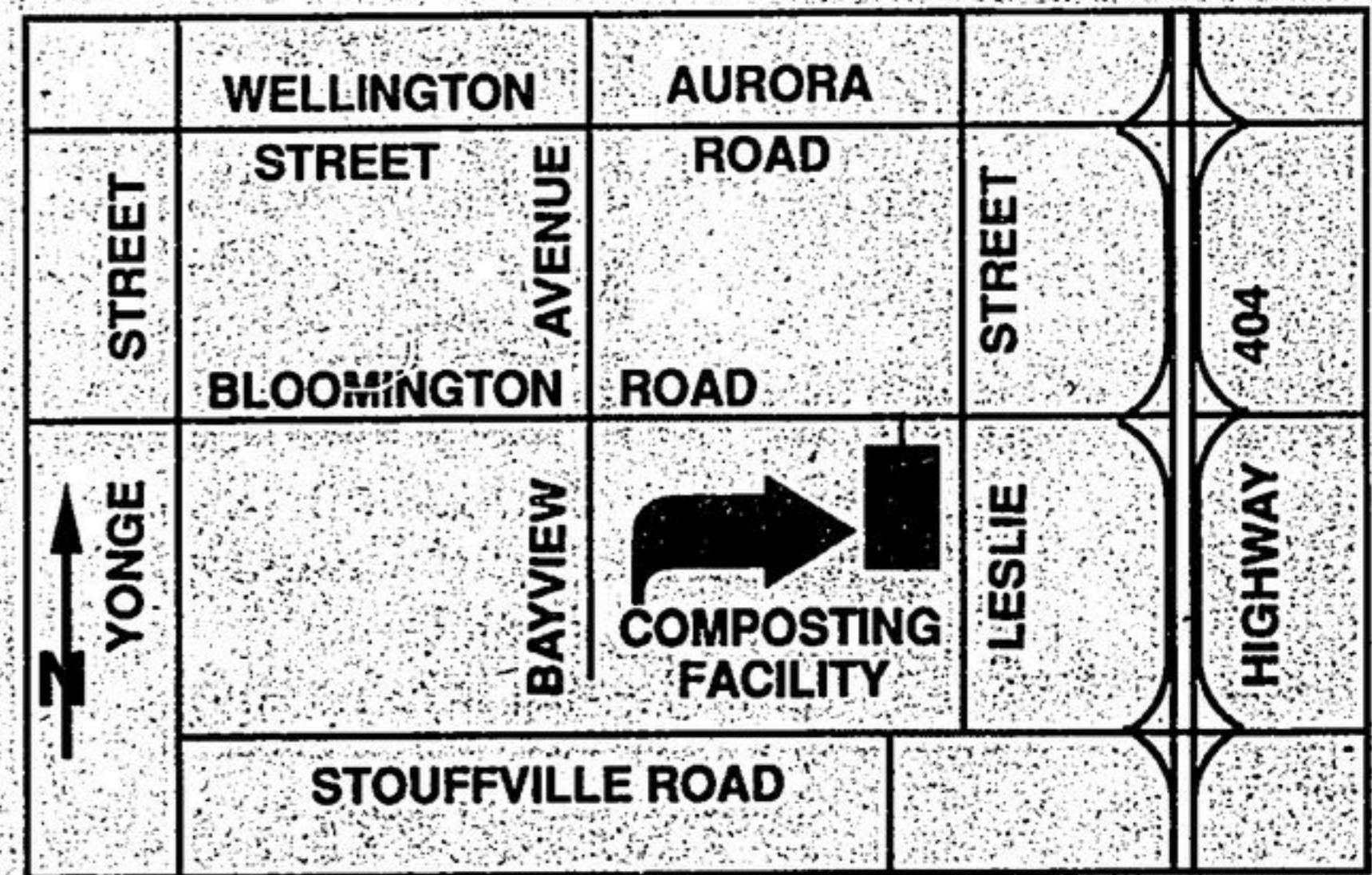
Many residents are now doing the "spring clean-up" of their yards, lawns and gardens. Organic yard waste has been banned from the Keele Valley Landfill to help conserve its remaining capacity. Residents and businesses in York Region may take these materials to York Region's Organic Yard Waste Composting Facility.

The Composting Facility is open to receive yard waste from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Saturday, from April 1 to December 31, excluding statutory holidays. During the months of January, February and March it is only open on Wednesdays.

Loads from residents are accepted free. Businesses and yard maintenance companies are charged \$40 per tonne (plus tax).

Acceptable organic yard waste includes leaves, grass clippings, shrubs, branches, weeds, garden plants and flowers. Please **DO NOT** include tree trunks, stumps and branches greater than 6 inches (150 mm) in diameter, food and kitchen wastes, animal droppings, fruit and vegetables, or driveway and road sweepings.

The Composting Facility is located on the south side of Bloomington Road, just west of Leslie Street in the Town of Richmond Hill, as shown on the following map.



## COLLECTION OF LEAVES AND YARD WASTE

Many of the Region's 9 municipalities will be providing their residents with special curbside collections for leaves and yard waste. **PLEASE NOTE THAT YOU MUST USE CLEAR PLASTIC BAGS**, rather than coloured bags. Collection staff will look through the clear bags to quickly check that no contaminants have been included accidentally. Clear plastic bags are available at many of the larger stores.

Most yard waste collection programs allow for tree and shrub clippings to be placed at the curb, tied in bundles not longer than 4 feet (1.2 m) and not heavier than 50 pounds (23 kg.). Also, some municipalities may allow residents to use rigid reusable containers, such as garbage cans and bushel baskets, for the curbside collection of leaves and yard waste. Residents should watch for public notices issued by their municipality and check for details such as these.

## COMPOST AVAILABLE FOR SALE

Compost is now available for sale only, at the Composting Facility. The cost is \$2.00 per bag (tax included), which residents must fill themselves. Plastic bags (20x30-inch nominal size) are provided.

Residents may also fill their own pick-up trucks or trailers and the cost is \$10.00 per tonne (plus tax) with a minimum charge of \$10.00 (plus tax).

**PLEASE BRING YOUR OWN SHOVELS TO AVOID WAITING AND COME EARLY BECAUSE THE FACILITY CLOSES AT 4:00 P.M.**

Landscaping companies, farmers, contractors and other large quantity users can purchase bulk loads of compost. They may call the facility operator, Miller Waste Systems, at 773-9876 for details.

## RECYCLING YARD WASTE AT HOME

The best way for residents to manage their yard waste is to recycle it at home. This saves residents the work of bagging grass clippings and leaves and also minimizes municipal collection and processing costs.

Leaves and grass can be mulched and placed around shrubs and plants to hold in moisture and deter weed growth. In addition, grass clippings, less than one inch (25 mm) long, can be left on the lawn to fertilize the soil.

Residents can also compost much of their yard waste at home. Most of the 9 municipalities have various types of backyard composters available to sell to their residents. Call your municipality for details.
