Bowes honored by teachers

The four vehicles were parked on Sandiford Dr. and belonged to Down East Auto, Aveco Pool Services, both of Sandiford Dr., and Harris Management of Markham. The property damage occurred between 3 p.m. Saturday and 11:30 a.m. Sunday and damage is set at \$6,000.

Council eyes \$340,000 in road repairs

Local politicians are expected to approve \$340,000 worth of local road repairs this week after viewing a staff report recommending the projects be undertaken.

"This year's spring road break-up has been one of the worst in many years," said town public works director, Paul Whitehouse. He is recommending council approve spending \$342,000 - 70 per cent of which will be designated to rural-area, gravel roads.

In his Road Repair Program report to officials Whitehouse said by spending most of the money on rural roads does not "imply that the urban area roads are not deficient but remain in a more stable condition than the rural roads," Whitehouse said.

Whitehouse is using a criteria, including traffic volume, local residents' input, weight of vehicles and present conditions, to determine which roads become top repair priority. The monies will come from roads operating budget (\$90,000), road reserve account (\$162,200) and taxes (\$90,000), a report shows.

The following roads are considered top priority and labelled worst conditions:

- ° McCowan Road - eight locations from Bloomington to Vandorf Roads; Vandorf to Aurora Roads, and Aurora to St. John's Road - \$55,000
- ° Vandorf Road - the entire 2 km stretch from Hwy 48 to McCowan and McCowan to Kennedy Road - \$144,000
- ° Warden Avenue - Bloomington to Aurora Roads; Aurora to Vivian Roads - \$105,000
- ° spot repairs to Church Street; O'Brien, Russel, Rose and Rupert Avenues.

The town actually needs more than \$1 million worth of rural and urban road repairs as outlined in Whitehouse's report, which will be presented to officials for discussion this week.
