

Frost reacquires Spring Lakes golfing facilities

Spring Lakes Golf and Country Club, the largest course in Canada, is to be reacquired by Mac Frost.

Frost sold the 640-acre, Hwy. 48-Stouffville Rd. property to a Switzerland-based consortium headed by lawyer-developer Don Goldman and banker-financier John Pierre Scheidegger in December, 1989. The group also manages the King Valley Golf Club, located between King City and Aurora.

In a letter issued to Spring Lakes members earlier this month, Frost and Spring Lakes general manager Dave Wood said the Frost family agreed to a deal with the present owners in March of this year, with the sale to be finalized this Nov. 1.

The letter reassured members that it will be business as usual during the transition period.

"The club will continue to fulfill its commitments and maintain the high quality of the golf course and the club's facilities and services," it stated.

"The Frosts have assured us that the current members will be treated fairly and will be informed of any new policies as soon as they are decided but that any changes should only enhance the members' opportunity to play the golf course."

The private course, which includes three 18-hole courses, hosts numerous tournaments each season.

The annual Rolex Pro-Junior Tournament is to be played at Spring Lakes next month, with the Pro Club Champions Tournament scheduled for August at the course.

Tough going for Indians
