## Joseph is not singing the Blues

The stars were out at the Emerald Hills Golf Course Monday as Brett Hull held his second annual Noma Charity Celebrity Golf Classic.

The Golden Brett had his father Bobby in tow, along with his St. Louis Blues team mate Curtis Joseph, the Sharon resident who helped the Whitchurch-Stouffville Vandorf Juniors to the provincial "A" fastball title back in 1988.

Other past and present National Hockey Leaguers participating in the team scramble, won by Brett Hull and his squad, were Peter Eng, Rocky Saganiuk, Eddie Shack, and Dick Redmond. Redmond took the longest drive contest held after the tournament with a booming 325 yarder.

World championship Canadian skater Kurt Browning, skier Brian Stempel, and Buffalo Bills' kicker Steve Christie were among the other athletes participating at the event.

For their part, the Emerald Hills people were offering to donate \$1,000 towards diabetes research being done at Toronto's Hospital for Sick Children for every non-celebrity in the tournament who signed on as a club member.

I managed to commandeer Joseph for a few minutes after the longest drive competition. It would appear Joseph's rec-

ollections of his ball playing days in Vandorf are vague at best. It's amazing what four years of travelling around North America as a big league goalie will do to the memory.

He said he's extremely happy in St. Louis, and will likely sign a new contract with the Blues after his current pact expires. He has one more year, followed by an option year, remaining on his current deal.

As for the Blues' playoff run this spring, Joseph said he was disappointed the team didn't go further. "If you don't win the Stanley Cup, it means you lost your last game," he philosophized. "We lost our last game, it wasn't how we would have liked it."

Joseph acknowledged the Blues did have a good run, however, especially considering the team's sluggish beginning to the 1992-93 season. He suggested the Blues may have been somewhat spent after fighting so hard just to qualify for post season play and that next season may be different. "We did come from a long way back. It took all we had just to make the playoffs. We jelled after the first half this year. If we can pick up where we left off this fall we'll be okay."

Joseph, who admitted his loyalties lay with the Leafs as a kid growing up in Sharon, said it was a huge thrill just to play against the players he once looked up to. "As a kid,

you idolize the guys in the NHL. The biggest thrill for me was just to play in the NHL against the players I idolized."


As for his charges during the series with the Maple Leafs that the Toronto forwards were "running" him, he simply shrugged. "We got beat by a good team. They played hard, and we played hard. They went to the net, and that's what you have to do to win."

Joseph said he thought it was great for hockey to see the Leafs back in the chase after such a long drought. "The fans around here have been starved for a good team for so long. It's good for the game in this area to have the Leafs winning again."
