## Man charged in police chase

A car being followed by police crashed in Stouffville early Monday morning. York Region police report a car was spotted travelling in an erratic manner north of Hwy 48 at Steeles Ave in Markham at about 4:55 a.m. Police followed the vehicle which reached speeds in excess of 180 kilometres per hour on Hwy 48, and ran red lights at Robinson St., Major Mackenzie Dr. and Stouffville Rd. The driver of the vehicle eventually lost control and crashed into a ditch on the northeast corner of Bloomington Rd and Hwy 48, police said. The driver was not injured in the crash, though the vehicle skidded for more than 124 metres before ending up in the ditch. An 18-year-old Scarborough man faces charges of dangerous operation, two counts of breach of probation and failure to comply.

In Toronto, the CTL will be at Parkview Village from today to Sept. 9.

"We're really trying to bring an awareness of all the things available for people with communication problems," said Barbara Collier, AACS coordinator.

"There's an incredible lack of services for people in the province." According to the Hugh MacMillan Centre, an estimated 200,000 adults in Ontario have severe speech problems which require Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC). Many of them have speaking difficulties due to physical disabilities such as cerebral palsy or as a result of head injuries or other neurological conditions.

"AAC refers to ways other than speech and handwriting which can be used to send messages from one person to another. AAC systems include communication displays, gestures, signing, voice-input devices and adaptive computers for writing. Only two accredited programs exist in the province to serve adults with

severe speech problems. While the province does provide funding assistance for hi-tech communication devices for people born after July 1963, there is only limited financial assistance available for older people in need.

Dr. Max Korn, a senior consultant with the Assisted Devices Program (ADP) branch of the Ministry of Health, says the issue isn't money.

"The problem is there aren't sufficiently trained teams of professionals to serve people with communication problems," he said, adding that some pilot projects for adults are under way. "If you have multiple disabilities, severe communication problems, we don't have the teams out there to meet the need."

The Communication Technology Lab will not be selling devices, but can steer people in the right direction if they wish to purchase some of them, said Collier. If you are interested in scheduling a visit to the lab while it's in Stouffville, call Ruth or Anne at 642-2053.

## Gas line severed on 9th

The fire department was called to the Stouffville Mews townhouse development on the Ninth Line Sunday afternoon after a backhoe severed a Consumer's Gas line.

Deputy Fire Chief Murray Emmerson said while caution is always advisable when dealing with natural gas, staff were easily able to handle the problem.

"You've always got the potential for danger... but they were able to plug it and seal it enough so that Consumer's could carry on with their repair work," he said.

Emmerson added that a fire crew was only at the scene for about 45 minutes.

Mike Grifa, Consumer's operations manager, said the line, intended to service the new townhouses, was punctured by the builder, adding that no customers were affected.

A work crew shut the gas off before cutting out and replacing the affected section "in no time at all," said Grifa.

Courtney Newmarch, director of sales and marketing for Kevin Doble Properties, said construction crews are working on weekends to meet a deadline.

## Power skating school to be offered


