I am still in room 1243, still in Bed B, still in Markham Stouffville Hospital, still carting around an IV rack and still eating hospital grub.

Yes, as I write this, it is two days before Christmas and I am one day out of surgery.

**Emergency surgery.** Code red surgery that required a specialist to be brought in.

The crisis that sent me rushing to the hospital just two days ago?

A hang-nail.

me, could this happen.

Sunday I get a hang-nail, Monday it gets red. By Tuesday, my finger looks like a ball-park frank on steroids; the pain in my hand would have nauseated the Inquisition and my knuckles could have played a supporting role in Laurence of Arabia.

Tuesday morning, the doctor tells me I may have pie-in-the-eye tendonitis or something like that.

He says the infection has spread to my tendon sheath. I will definitely have to see the hand spe-

cialist.

I will definitely have to be admitted and before I know it, there's ample talk of cutting me open.

The hand specialist, a plastic surgeon named Wallman, tells me surgery is definite. Likely tomorrow.

I am admitted. Feeling terrible. Not from the finger, but at the prospect of spending Christmas Day watching the Queen's message in a hospital common room and toasting her with a cup of Cefazolin.

Dr. Wallman returns, his eyebrows go up his forehead as he determines that the germs that have moved into my hand for the holidays have invited all their relatives.

He moves the surgery up to 6 p.m. He comes

back half an hour later, looks at the germ highway under construction along the back of my hand and tells me to be ready in 45 minutes.

The next thing I remember, I am being strapped down and told that I am getting a little drowsy.

I wake up screaming in pain. The recovery room nurse has administered the legal limit of morphine, but I beg for the rest of the hospital's supply.

After I stop seeing little blue bunnies and big wooly spiders wearing rubber boots, I become aware of my hand, now heavily bandaged and just as sore as before the operation.

And so here I sit. And wait. I should know by tomorrow night whether I'll be home for

Christmas.

I'll also know if I can take my cruise. Friends and relations have been calling, many to find out if I had "Lucien's disease".

I don't.

If there is one positive aspect about this affair, it is that I have devel-

oped a keener sense of what is important in life. Especially at this time of year. Family, friends and neighbors. That's what counts.

And it's what will help get me over this.

Good health to you in 1995. I'll send you a postcard.
