

Light bulb display this weekend

MUSEUM WINNERS

First place winner in the Drivers' Choice Awards in the Antique Category (pre-1945) at the Whitchurch-Stouffville Museum Car Show was Al Webster's 1932 Packard, with Bill Rice's 1938 Ford the runner-up. A 1959 Oldsmobile, owned by Tom Luke, took top honors in the Classic Category (1945-75) with Paul Smith's 1962 Chevrolet placing second.

People's Choice Award winners were as follows: Antique Category winner John Bosworth's Model T, runner-up Al Webster's 1932 Packard; Classic Category Winner: Tom Luke's 1959 Oldsmobile with Paul Smith's 1967 Corvette named runner-up. More than 400 people attended the show and 200 cars were exhibited.

A LIGHT TOUCH

Stouffville's Ivan Harris will shed illumination on the history of lighting this weekend at the Uxbridge-Scott Museum's Steam Threshing Days. In 'A Light on the Past', Harris will exhibit about 100 samples from his fascinating and comprehensive light bulb collection, which dates back to the 1890s and includes everything from hand blown bulbs to lasers



He began collecting light bulbs in the late sixties, when he worked in the technical department of GBC. His collection grew rapidly and he began to undertake serious research on the subject. Among the items which will be on display is a 10,000 watt bulb which was used in the theatre and a bulb with two light levels, made in about 1905 for use in infirmaries.

Uxbridge-Scott Museum is located on the 6th Concession of Uxbridge, just north of Durham Rd. 8. Steam Threshing Days runs Aug. 26 and 27 from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Admission is \$5 for adults and \$3 for seniors and students. Children accompanied by adults will be admitted free.

HARVEST FEST

With summer drawing to a close, there's plenty to look forward to this fall. Bruce's Mill conservation area will hold its fourth annual Harvest Fest Sept. 16 and 17, with activities for the whole family.

A collection of antique equipment, including steam engines, tractors, vintage cars and motorcycles will be on display and visitors can buy fresh produce at the farmers' market. Other attractions include apple cider pressing, arts and crafts, a petting zoo, free pony and horse drawn wagon rides and free hot air balloon rides.

Visitors will have the chance to win a champagne balloon ride for two and can enjoy outdoor entertainment by square dancers, cloggers and country and western bands. Children can hone their artistic skills at the arts and crafts centre and participate in traditional games and races.

Admission is \$5 for adults, \$3.50 for seniors and \$2.50 for children.
