

'Terry's Team' gearing up for Sept. 17 annual run

tumor in a kidney when he was just two years old. The little fellow was 18 months old when his parents learned he had cancer.

Rolly Fox told *The Tribune* that he's "absolutely amazed" that 15 years after his son began his Marathon of Hope, the run is carried out in 54 countries worldwide. "We never thought it would turn into this. It is amazing," said Rolly.

A few times during Betty Fox's account of her son's courage and of his passing, the audience was brought to tears. A few times, Terry Fox's mother stopped to clear her throat and wipe away a tear. As one Stouffville resident pointed out, "no one here today will forget meeting Betty and Rolly Fox."

During her address, Betty Fox shared the details leading up to her boy's Marathon of Hope, which began by his dipping his artificial leg into the Atlantic Ocean in 1980.

Betty Fox reminded the audience that her son ran 26 miles a day for a total of 3,339 miles.

Terry's run was halted in Thunder Bay, when cancer spread to his lungs. Betty and Rolly's son died on June 28, 1981, four months shy of his 23rd birthday. The Marathon of Hope, however, continues. Terry Fox's mother, his father, his two brothers and his sister join many members of Terry's Team to continue to help keep the boy's dream alive. No one appreciates the Fox family's commitment to cancer research more than the members of Stouffville's Terry Team, especially its newest member, Dixie Sellers.

Life is oftentimes full of surprises. Sellers was the organizer of Stouffville's first Terry Fox Run. Little did she know that 14 years later, she'd face a personal struggle.

During a minor surgical procedure, doctors discovered that Sellers has a life-threatening tumor. She underwent major surgery in June and is now on the road to recovery.

Sellers has a message for everyone. "I had rectal cancer. I want everyone to have a routine examination."

While Sellers stressed that early detection saved her life, Betty Fox pointed out that had her son gone to a doctor earlier, he might be alive today. "I can't stress early detection enough," said Betty Fox.

Murphy, a dentist, was diagnosed with rectal cancer in 1980. He's been a top money raiser in the Terry Fox Run since joining Terry's Team team in 1991.

Gyton was told she had breast cancer four years ago. Since then, Gyton has helped many other cancer patients in the York-Durham area by establishing Connecting Rainbows, a cancer support group. Gyton will, once again, walk the 10 kilometers on Sept. 17.

In 1980, Terry Fox set out to raise \$1 from each and every Canadian for a total \$20 million. As Stouffville's population nears 20,000, Sandy Schell Kennedy, local run director, said Terry's Team is hoping to help raise at least \$20,000 this year. Betty Fox said country-wide, a remarkable \$152 million has been raised for innovative cancer research projects. She stressed that

more than 550,000 Canadians walked, ran, wheeled and roller-bladed their way to a record year.

Betty Fox extended a very personal "thank you" to Stouffville. She pointed out that this small community has cared enough to raise a total of \$133,000 in the past 13 years. "It is a wonderful gift," she said. In closing, Betty Fox repeated her son's often repeated words: "Somewhere the hurting has to stop."

Bar has liquor licence pulled

A Stouffville bar has had its liquor licences lifted for 30 days following a hearing in Toronto, the Liquor Licence Board of Ontario (LLBO) has reported.

Spyder Joe's lost its licence after being found guilty of offenses under the Liquor Licence Act, Elizabeth Garel, LLBO spokesman, said.

The one-month licence suspension went into effect on Aug. 14.

The Ringwood Drive establishment will not be able to serve alcohol until Sept. 12.

Business owner Joe Colicchio told *The Tribune* that in the wake of the suspension, he's taking a one-month vacation and plans to re-open in mid-September. At the hearing, a LLBO inspector testified that during a check of the Stouffville premises on Nov. 9, he found five bottles of liquor which appeared to be illegal liquor, said Garel.

The suspicious booze included Bacardi White rum, Alberta vodka, Hiram Walker's gin, Southern Comfort whiskey and Captain Morgans rum.

Tests carried out at the LLBO laboratory showed that the Alberta vodka contained citric acid, an ingredient not found in vodka sold in LCBO stores.

Garel could not explain how the substandard liquor got in the bottles.

The local club owner did, however, tell the board members that the establishment has trouble with fruit flies, said Garel.

Colicchio told the hearing that staff pour liquor in and

out of bottles in order to get rid of the flies. In addition, Colicchio also said staff pour liquor from bottles with little liquor in them to fuller bottles.

Colicchio told *The Tribune* someone attending a stag at his establishment left a bottle of U.S. alcohol behind. A Spyder Joe's waitress also told the hearing that the Alberta vodka might have been brought into the premises by persons who attended a stag there sometime before Nov. 9.

This is not Colicchio's first encounter with the LLBO. Seven years ago, the LLBO slapped a seven-day licence suspension on Garden Club Cafe, the former Spyder Joe's, also owned by Colicchio.

The LLBO board ordered Colicchio to take the Smart Serve program offered by Hospitality Industry Training Organization within the next 120 days.
