Teachers chant for strike

Rattling noisemakers, waving signs and chanting for a strike, hundreds of teachers stood in chilling cold Thursday on the frozen lawn of their public school board headquarters.

"I call it the Mother Hubbard board," declared Joan Heeler, a union president for York Region elementary teachers.

Recalling the nursery rhyme in which a cupboard is bare, Heeler asked the Aurora crowd of about 1,000, "I wonder what that hungry dog did to that old Mother Hubbard?"

She was answered with calls of "Strike, strike!" when Heeler announced the twin elementary unions would ask for the board's final offer that day, the next step to a strike vote.

Gerarda Schouten, a teacher at Willowbrook Public School in Thornhill, took up the chant banging a cookie tin with a piece of wood. "They never had any intention of negotiating with us," charged George Auerbach, a teacher at Bayview Glen Public.

Teachers are angry that half their daily preparation time

was shifted to after school — the board announced the move, still being challenged by the unions, in April — and have a strong message for the board, said union president Fred Mayor. "They are not interested in rolling over and playing dead," he warned.

Later, Heeler, addressing

Company may still relocate



The plan to bring a 700,000-square foot kitchen furniture manufacturing plant to Stouffville is still alive.

In a week, town officials, including Whitchurch-Stouffville mayor Wayne Emmerson and economic development officer Eric Limanis will meet with the brass of Canac Business Centre to discuss the plan to have the manufacturing plant and its 500 employees relocate from Thornhill to Vandorf.

The company owns land in the area, including a 35-acre site on

The cigarette cops would be over worked in Stouffville. To mark National Non-smoking Week, a survey was carried out by *The Tribune* with the help of 17-year-old non-smoker John Lambersky.

The survey showed that nine out of 10 Stouffville merchants, or 90 per cent, willingly sold cigarettes to a minor in direct contravention of the law.

Trust fund for infant established

A trust fund has been set up for a six-week-old baby who's father was killed in Stouffville last week.

An industrial accident last Friday at Gormley's Dynatec Mining Ltd. claimed the life of a 27-year-old Joe Parsons of Manilla, formerly of Stouffville. Funeral services were held Monday at Wideman

Mennonite Church on Hwy. 48. Parsons was raised by Bob and Cathy Williams of 19th Avenue. He attended Dickson Hill Public School.

Parsons was operating a sandblaster when co-workers found him unconscious. He died at York Central Hospital shortly after arriving by ambulance. Parsons and his

wife Tonya were married in 1995. Soon after, the couple bought a home in Manilla. Meanwhile baby Kayla was born just before Christmas.

Donations to the trust fund can be made at the Stouffville Toronto Dominion Bank on Main St.

The accident remains under investigation.

Halt development at lake: Watson

Clean water and lots of it for Musselman's Lake and Ballantrae is the driving force behind a plan being debated at Whitchurch-Stouffville council this coming Tuesday.

Ward 1 councillor Mike Watson said he's picking up the ball where the late councillor Ed Lyons left off.

The rookie councillor wants to have the new communal water system up and running for three years before allowing more development in the area.

This means that the Shickendanz proposal would be put on hold along with any further development for a full three years.

"We need to make sure the well has the quality and quantity of water before it's at full
