

Candidates must get permission for signs on private land

It is an offence to take down, remove, cover up, mutilate, deface or alter any printed advertisement, placard, poster or banner having reference to the election of a candidate without authority, according to the Canada Elections Act.

"Complaints or allegations of wrongdoing regarding this or any other section of the Act should be reported in writing to the Commis-

sioner of Canada Elections in Ottawa, who is responsible for ensuring that Act is complied with an enforced," said Chief Electoral Officer of Canada Jean-Pierre Kingsley.

"Where candidates or political parties wish to place campaign signs on private property, they should obtain the consent of the owner of the property," he noted.

"Tenants and condominium owners should

check the terms of the lease or purchase agreement, which may preclude them from posting campaign signs."

With regard to signs on public property, Kingsley urged candidates and political parties to consult with the municipality in which they intend to place signs to ensure that local requirements are respected.

Candidates and parties wanting to place

signs on public property belonging to the federal or provincial Crown should contact the government department or agency which administers the property to ascertain the rules and limits concerning campaign signs.

"Essentially, it is the responsibility of the candidate, the political party or their agents to establish their right to place a campaign sign on any property," said Kingsley.

Doris Anderson was editor for Chatelaine Magazine for 20 years where she established the magazine as a leading voice for Canadian feminism in the 1960's and 1970's. In 1979 she became president of the Canadian Advisory Council on the Status of Women in Ottawa. Her resignation in 1980 sparked what became known as the "Ad Hoc" conference, and resulted in an entirely new clause in Canada's Charter of Rights that confirmed the equality of women and men.

YRAP, established in 1987, provides leadership throughout all communities in York Region to eliminate child abuse through group therapy program, group therapist training program, court support program, abuse prevention program, volunteer program. YRAP offers the only child sexual abuse group therapy program available without charge in York Region.

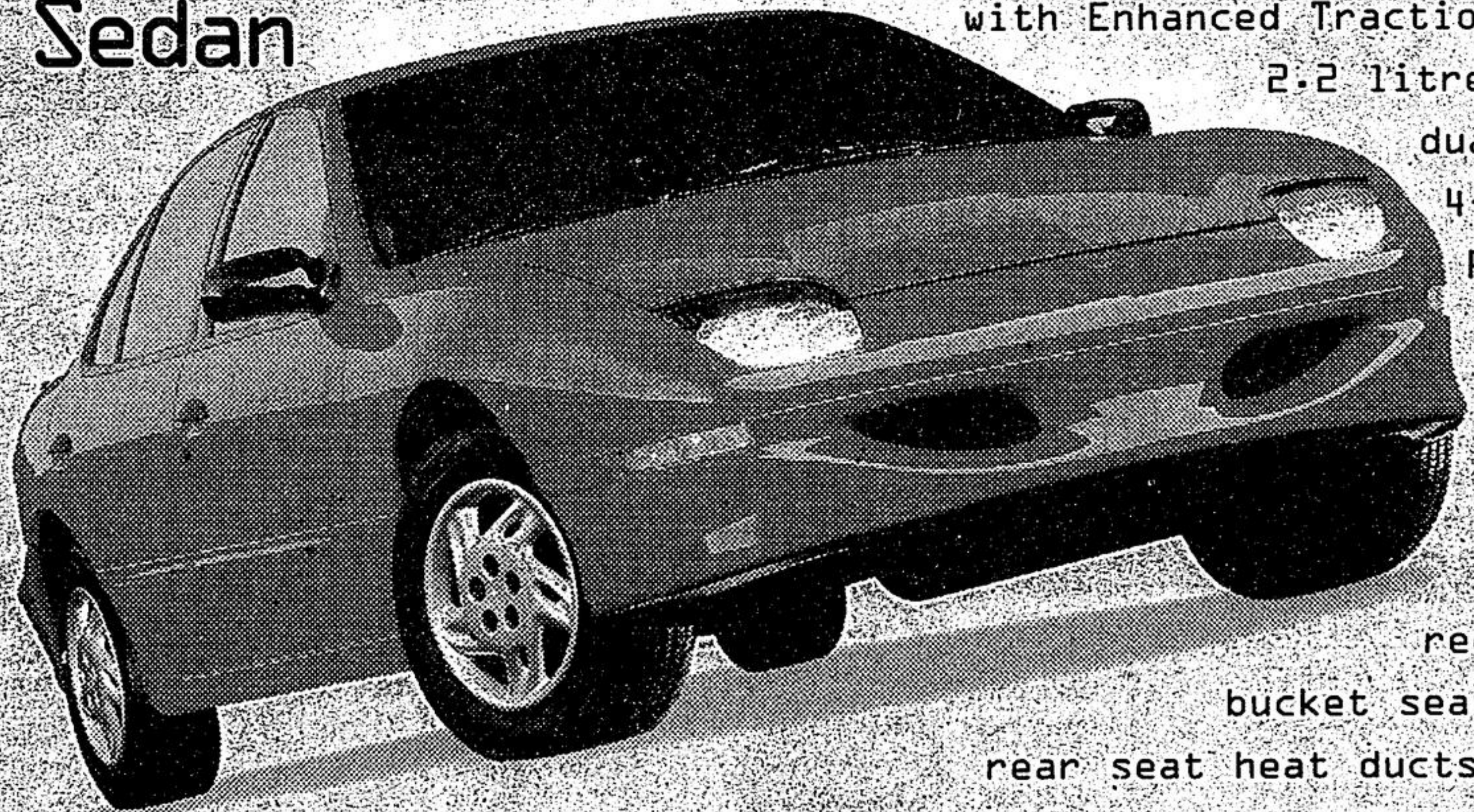
