The Newmarket 87's Hurricane came on like a typhoon in the early going of their game with the Spirit of Stouffville Thursday night at the Rec Centre, then skulked away with the two points and the pizza.

defending Hockey Ontario Association Provincial Junior A Hockey League east conference champions jumped out into a 3-1 first period lead, but were hanging on in the dying seconds of a 7-6 win over the rejuvenated Spirit.



The Newmarket squad survived a near-miss penalty shot by Spirit sniper Darcy King with just 22 seconds left in the game to salvage the victory.

King, who had scored on a two-man Spirit breakaway earlier in the game, was awarded the unobstructed chance when the 87's intentionally knocked the net off it's moorings as the Spirit blitzed their goal mouth in pursuit of the equalizer.

PIZZAS INTERCEPTED The Newmarket club added insult to injury after the game, going from Hurricane to scavenger as they intercepted the complementary pizzas destined for the

Spirit dressing room. Despite losing the game and their post game meal, the Stouffville team was able to claim a moral victory.

"The boys were disappointed to be so close to taking them (the 87's) into overtime, but when it settles in they'll be satisfied with what they did," said Spirit assistant coach Trevor Clark. "We were happy with their effort. Everybody worked hard."

King's goal triggered a wide open second period, with the visitors quickly restoring their two- goal bulge.

Ed Kearney narrowed the gap again, and Geoff Keillor tied it with his fifth goal of the season on a Spirit power play.

The 87's scored two more times before Mike Micheff beat the buzzer with a lastsecond goal to bring the Spirit back to within a goal.

Newmarket appeared to put a lock on it when they made it 7-5 just past the half way goal which set up King's last ditch penalty shot effort. King, whose partially blocked wrist shot rolled just wide of the 87's net, said it was a lack of execution, not nerves, that foiled his penalty shot effort. "I wasn't nervous at all. I had him beat if I had got it back on my back hand," he said.

Goalkeeper Cory Lloyd was a magician in the Spirit net, robbing 87's shooters on numerous occasions to keep his team in the hunt.

"Without Cory we wouldn't have had the chance to be close at the end," said

Clark. The Spirit were scheduled to travel to Aurora to take on the Tigers in the first of a home and home set on Friday.
