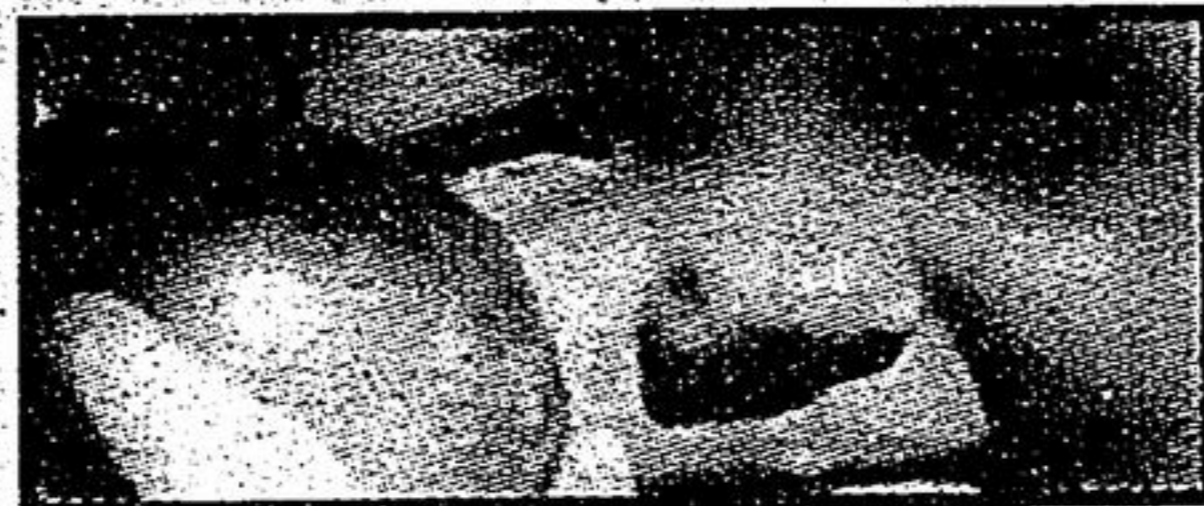

## Hazardous waste depot scrapped

It's official: A household waste depot will not be built anywhere in

Stouffville.

Mayor Wayne Emmerson scored a victory on Wednesday when he convinced his colleagues on York Regional Council to stop any move

to put a facility at Woodbine Ave. and St. John Sideroad.

Instead, Stouffville residents will be directed to take their household waste, including paints, pesticides

and oils, to Newmarket in late October or to Markham or Georgina in January.

Two months ago, Emmerson received a 350-name petition at Whitchurch-Stouffville Council asking local government to help stop the plan to put a household hazardous waste operation beside an existing regional depot at Woodbine Ave. and St. John Sideroad.

### PLANNING

Area residents expressed fears about environmental concerns linked to the plan to change how the household waste materials are handled.

"I met with the people and acted on their behalf. It's worked out very well," said Emmerson.

## Smoking bylaw to be aired in public forum

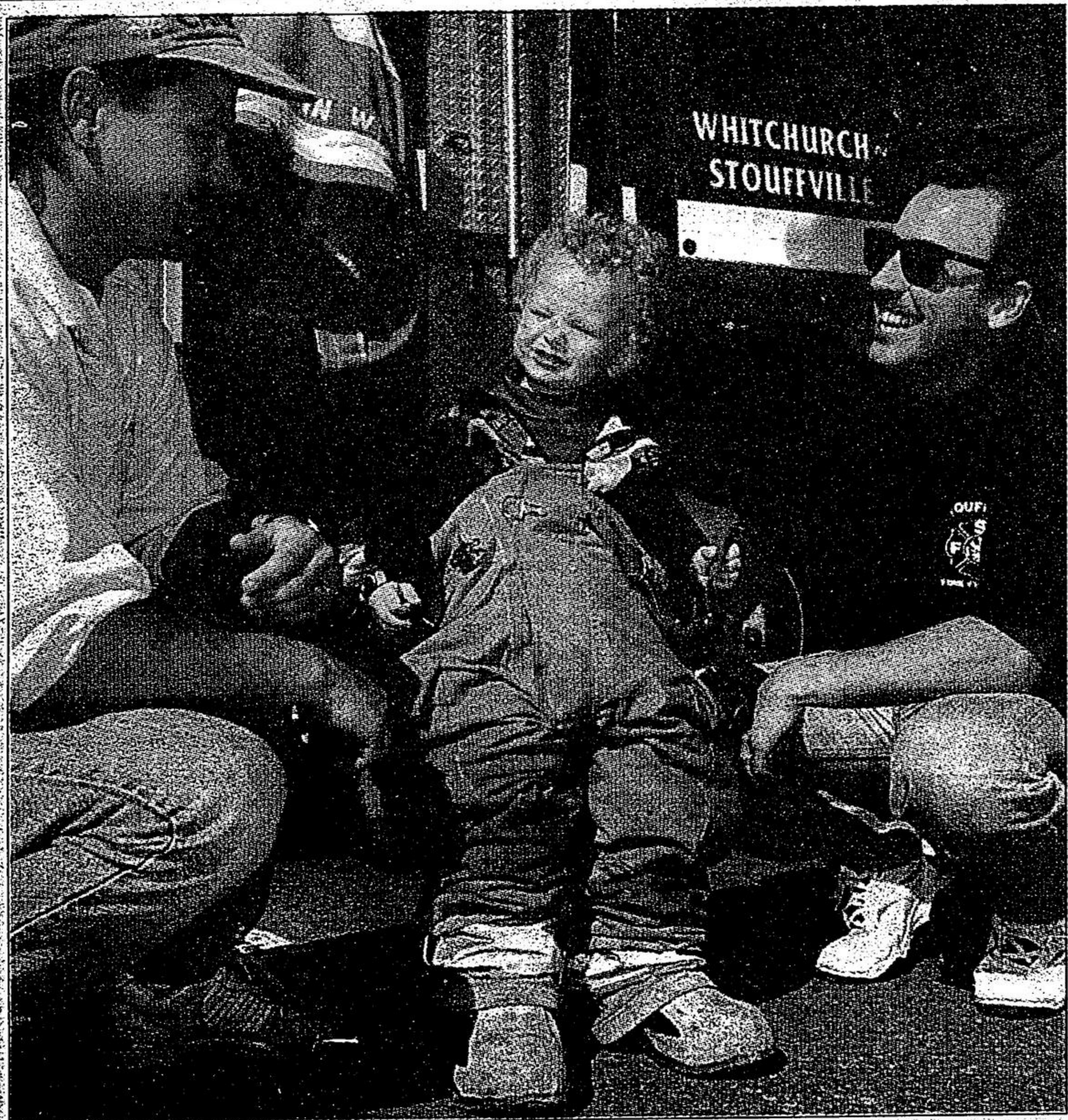
Public input is needed before new smoking laws can be introduced in Stouffville.

The public, including business owners, are being asked to attend a local council meeting on Oct. 14 and tell local council how they think smoking should be handled.

"The issue will be aired on the 14th. I hope those interested attend," said Whitchurch-Stouffville Mayor Wayne Emmerson.

York Region is considering a tough bylaw which would ban smoking immediately from food courts, restrict it in other places and make the entire region smoke-free by January 1, 2000.
