Largest employer coming?

A new operation looking at making Whitchurch-Stouffville home could eventually be the town's largest employer.

That was one of the messages heard at an Economic Development Advisory Committee luncheon at Emerald Hills Golf and Country Club last week.

Hosted by EDAC and the new business development office of the town, the event was also designed to boost the Stouffer Vision Fund, and initiative launched last year, and currently supported by 22 of the municipality's largest companies.

Eric Lismanis, the business development officer for the town, told the crowd that as many as four plant expansions, and four new industries, are planned, including one unnamed company which would become the largest in town. Lismanis also outlined what his office has been up to for the past six months.

He noted that "downtown needs rejuvenation," and that the seeds planted by the business development office were beginning to bear fruit in the form of new ventures being started up and inquiries from across Ontario about setting up new enterprises.

In order to boost business, Lismanis announced plans for an FM radio transmitter to broadcast the benefits of Whitchurch-Stouffville to Hwy. 404 commuters, augmented with appropriated signage.

He added that a manufacturers' directory, and equestrian directory and other resources were being com-

piled or had been completed.

Peter Burdon, chair of the development committee, spoke of the need for local business to work together to boost the town's fortunes.

"It is time businesses stopped complaining about the problems and worked together to solve them," he urged. "This is the future and you have to be a part of it if you are going to be successful."

He added that local business could no longer be dictated to by the market trends of towns like Newmarket and Aurora. "We can't let them guide the future of Whitchurch-Stouffville."

The chair then urged the business leaders in attendance to join those enrolled in Stouffer Fund, which would extend the contract of Lismanis and continue to operate the business development office.

"We're selling tickets to the future, and you'd better get one," he concluded.

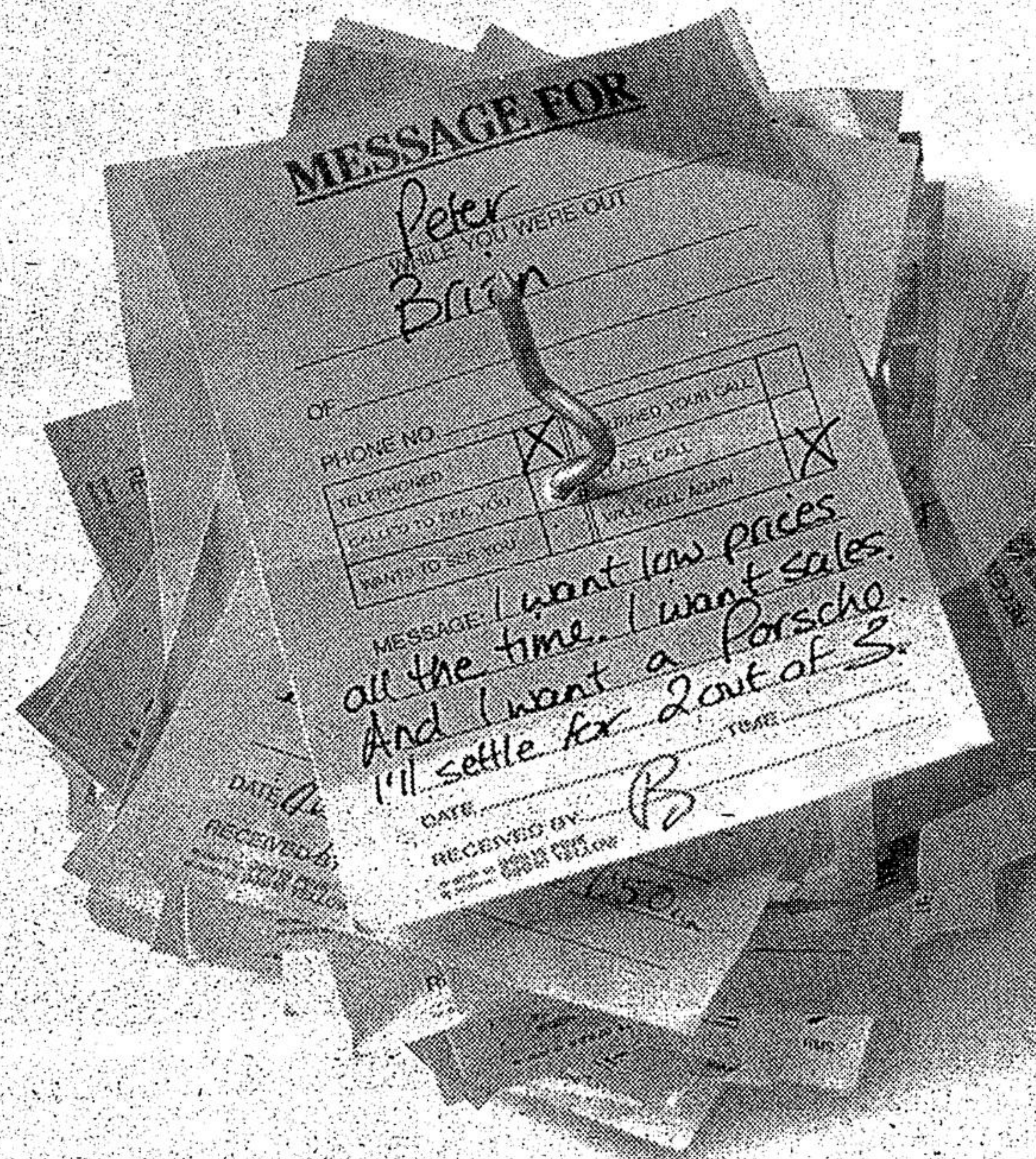
