

Browsing leads reader on journey of discovery

The only question more difficult to answer than "What do I read now?" is, "What can I give my child to read?"

Well, there's a new book which provides an interesting solution to this question: Arlene Perly-Rae's *Everybody's Favourites: Canadians Talk About Books That Changed Their Lives*.

It sounds like dry reading, but like peanuts, you'll find yourself dipping in for just one more.

A quick scan of the table of contents lists the Canadians under broad categories such as Early Memories, Adventure Stories, Books about Nature, and Transition to Adult Literature.

Even the ten appendixes are good to read. There are lists of various

awards, short stories, poetry, notable Canadian series, and the Morningside Children's List. As adults, this book is like a trip home; So many people loved all of L.M. Montgomery's books and C.S. Lewis' Narnia series.

Still, there's fun in discovering what inspired people like Roberta Bondar, Ernie Coombs (Mr. Dressup), or Bob Rae, who tells us, "A high-school teacher of mine grew tired of my yakking on about the benefits of the Russian and French revolutions. 'For God's sake, Rae. Find a little irony in life. Read Orwell.' And so I did."

But perhaps the best description of a browsing discovery is described by Andrew Moodie. "I got to the bottom

of the stairs and out of the corner of my eye, I saw the words, 'The Africans.' I pulled the book off the shelf. The Africans, by Basil Davidson; the cover proclaimed that it was An Entry to Cultural History. I opened it to the middle and looked inside. My life was never the same again. The next thing I remembered was the librarian hovering, her way of saying the library had been closed for fifteen minutes. ...Soon I was reading about..."

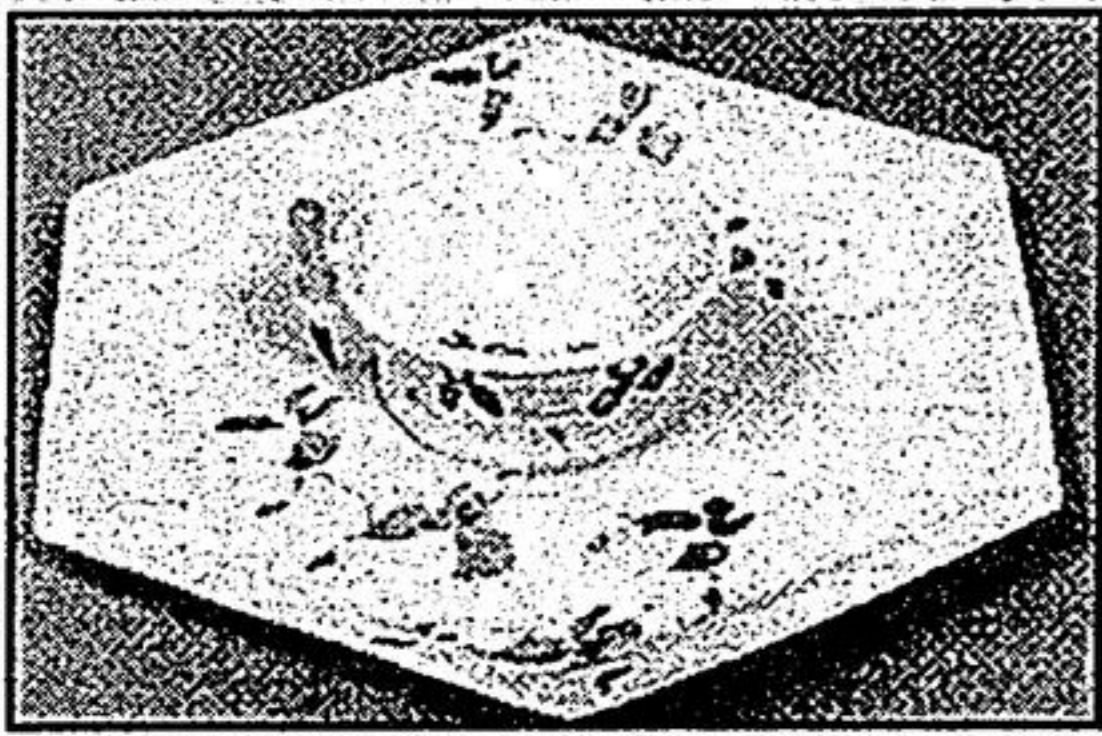
