Ward 4 the busiest; centre for business, population

WARD 4

Ward 4 could be called the heartbeat of Whitchurch-Stouffville, being the town's primary business district with a high residential mix.

The ward takes in a large part of the downtown core. It runs from the north side of Main Street from the railway tracks, west to Hwy. 48 to the east side of Hwy. 48 from Main Street North and carries on to take in a rural section to about a half a mile north of Bloomington Road.

More people go in and out of Ward 4 in a day than in any other ward in the municipality. Since Ward 4 houses the Stouffville Recreation Complex, including the arena with its twin ice pads, it's a very active spot.

As well, Ward 4 has a variety of businesses, including a trucking industry, family and fine dining restaurants and a host of fast food outlets. The ward also houses three schools, including the local high school, two nursing homes, three churches, three grocery stores, two car dealerships, gas stations and both the liquor and the beer store.

About 3,500 people call Ward 4 home — Ward 4 residents are of all ages and live in part of the residential area known as 'Old Stouffville.'

They live in the hamlets of Bloomington and Ringwood as well as out in the country. They live in apartments, in semis and in single-family homes.

The houses in Ward 4 come in all shapes and sizes and range from four to well-over 75 years old.

Candidate Cliff Dunkeld has been acclaimed to represent the ward.

Attention York Region Board of Education Parents, Guardians and Students

A province-wide strike by Ontario's teachers has been announced for Monday, October 27, 1997. Unless this is resolved through provincial negotiations with teachers over the next few days, the Ontario Teachers' Federation has indicated they will not be in the classroom on Monday. Although this action would be directed against the Government of Ontario to protest proposed legislation, York Region public schools will be affected. Our utmost concern is for the safety of students, staff and visitors.

If a strike occurs, The York Region Board of Education will:

- keep schools operational as long as sufficient staff are available and the safety of students and staff can be assured;
- suspend the offering of programs, including special education, until an assessment can be made of staff availability;
- encourage alternate arrangements be made for the care of your children
- cancel bus and field trips if and when necessary.

Child care operations in some schools may also be affected and some before-and after-school programs will be cancelled. Please check directly with the operators of these programs.

Please note that the Board is obligated under the Education Act to maintain school operations and that we will make every effort within our means to keep schools and facilities open. If we are unable to do so, information updates will be provided through the media and via a special Board information hotline (1-800-546-0709).

We appreciate that any disruption to school operations places a greater burden for care on parents and guardians. We thank you in advance for your patience and understanding.
