"Also, I will continue to promote well-planned growth. It includes taking a positive look at all industrial and commercial (businesses) wishing to locate in town. Of course, I'd like to keep our country atmosphere by protecting our present and proposed new park areas," said Dunkeld.

Promising "full time" representation and leadership in Ward 5, candidate Judy Saabas has a clearly defined platform: she's against building a new municipal building.

"I don't believe it's wise for council to spend any money on a new municipal building that many be obsolete in three years."

Saabas is in favor of a multi-use indoor pool facility. As a home-maker, Saabas said she's able to give council her "full time" attention.

The political hopeful wants to see the library expanded, a facelift for Main Street, improved road surfacing in the old village area and a new official plan for Stouffville.

As well, the environment matters to Saabas. "Environmental issues should not be looked at as an obstacle to forgo growth," she said.

The voters are quick to tell the candidate what they think of their government, said Saabas.

"People are telling me that they don't know who their councillors are. Also, I'm told that our council does not have a grip on things. Instead, people think the decisions are being made by others...by people not on council".

Saabas, 35, is married to Paul. The couple has two children. The family has lived in Stouffville for 11-years.

Ward 5 incumbent Judy Scala arrives on the voters' door steps armed with a three-year action plan.

In her quest for re-election, Scala is stressing the continuance and stability of the town.

Local government has to continue with a plan of action to "acknowledge and realize where we, the people of Whitchurch-Stouffville, want to be in the overall picture of municipal restructuring," said Scala.

Scala, 50, comes to the election campaign with a record of community involvement. And in her career as a communication specialist with a Canadian-owned company, Scala's proud of her people skills. She said she "listens" and she "understands" the people.

In her role on council, Scala was on the local BIA board, the mayor's youth committee, a community centre board as well as a high school committee board.

To improve communications within Ward 5, Scala plans to produce a newsletter. As well, she's promising to hold the occasional informal meeting session giving the residents a "chance to take part in the governing of their town."
