Stingers bring home provincial gold medal

It finally came together for the Cable Tech Stingers midget girls' softball team last weekend.

The Stouffville squad won four of five games played to capture the gold at the Provincial Women's Softball Association tier two midget qualifier in North Bay.

The Stingers won their first three games before suffering their only loss of the double knockout tournament to Oak Ridges in the first game of the final round.

But the Stingers bounced right back to trounce the Oak Ridges crew 9-1 to take the title.

The Stingers prevailed over nine other teams at the competition, earning a ticket to the championships in Byron on Aug. 28.

The North Bay tournament was one of four held across the province, with the top three teams from each tournament advancing to contest the provincial title.

Oak Ridges and Chinguacousy, which finished third, will accompany the Stingers to the provincial finals.

The Stouffville outfit began with a 4-3 comeback win over Chinguacousy. After surrendering a pair of unearned runs in the first

inning, Stingers pitcher Amanda Crowder shut down her opponents on just four hits the rest of the way.

Mandy Langford delivered two triples and a run batted in. Dawn Williamson and Michelle Dulude also had key RBIs, while Danielle Timms and Jocelyn Mills shone defensively.

Crowder fanned six as the Stingers downed Elmvale 7-5 in their second game. Langford and Denise Gaeta each had a pair of RBIs. Anne Marie Durante and Jackie Thorne also drove in runs.

Dulude scattered six hits and scored three runs as the Stingers dumped Oak Ridges 11-3 in a mercy-shortened game in their third outing. Timms also scored three times. Williamson drove in four runs.

But the Stingers got sloppy as they tried to clinch the title against Oak Ridges in their next contest.

The Stingers led 7-3, but let their opponents off the hook as they fell 9-7. Crowder socked a homer in the losing effort, with Durante picking up three hits.

The Stingers made sure as the two teams hooked up again for the mercy-shortened title tilt. Crowder closed out a weekend of stellar pitching with a three-hitter.

Timms had three runs, with Williamson and Dulude each knocking in a pair of runs.
