HEALTH COUNCIL: Doctor fired as chairperson

Doctor questions dismissal motives

Newmarket's Dr. Carter Thorne wants the Minister of Health to explain why she no longer wants him serving as chairperson of the district health council.

Thorne was shocked to learn Tuesday that Health Minister Elizabeth Witmer will not be renewing his appointment as a member of the Simcoe York District Health Council.

The surprising decision to dump Thorne, along with another unnamed DHC member, has some York health officials wondering if the minister is reacting to recent DHC criticism of political decisions by her government.

Thorne had been appointed as chairperson of the DHC for a three-year term, ending in 2001.

"I just can't believe it was an administrative issue," said DHC director Graham Constantine, adding when he asked ministry staff why Thorne was not being reappointed, he was told it was "the minister's prerogative".

Jeremy Adams of the Ministry of Health would only confirm that four appointments to the DHC expired last month, including Thorne's. He said he did not have any information on reappointments.

Thorne says he has no idea why the province no longer wants him serving in the position.

"I don't know what it is, I really can't say. I'm just baffled by it," he said yesterday. "They don't tell you a thing."

have drafted a letter to send to the minister expressing my disappointment and saying that I will continue to advocate on behalf of the community."

The DHC has been critical of the provincial government on two well-publicized occasions over the past few months.

In November, Thorne fired off a "report card" to the ministry asking it to follow through on Tory funding promises.

In his letter, Thorne listed seven areas where extra provincial funding had either been announced or recommended, but had not yet materialized.

"Our concern is that, in a growing area like York Region, we have increasing needs and have been promised funds but, in most cases, it hasn't been received," Thorne said at the time.

Former DHC member Dr. Jim Maclean, who served for six years on the council, says the decision not to continue Thorne's term is unfortunate.

"I think it's a shame," said Maclean, acting president of Markham Stouffville Hospital. "I think Carter was an excellent chair for the DHC and a real visionary, committed to high-quality health care. This does a real disservice to all of York Region and Simcoe County."

The DHC will hold its regular monthly meeting Monday night and members will decide then how they will fill the position of chairperson.
