

POLICE: Force is understaffed, audit finds

Chief seeks budget boost

York Regional Police Chief Julian Fantino is asking regional politicians to increase the force's budget by about 8 per cent this year.

Fantino said the increase will allow the department to hire 58 more police officers and civilian employees.

Hiking the annual operating budget to \$76 million will also help update aging technology.

Fantino said the budget responds to needs identified by a provincial audit of the force in 1997.

The audit showed that the force was understaffed and under-equipped.

"There is no way that I can see us continuing down the same road," he said.

Either we do this or we'd better pare down what it is that we expect from our police service."

The 8-per-cent increase will translate to an approximate 1.5-per-cent increase on the regional portion of property tax bills.

The police services board voted unanimously in favour of asking regional council for the increase.

"I think this is most reasonable given the circumstances," police board chairperson Margaret Black said. "I'm quite willing to fight for this at regional council."

The budget includes money for a new Keswick police station and new mobile computers for police cruisers.

The budget is expected to go to the region's finance committee next week.



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Erasing regions debated

Eliminating one level of government on agenda for GTA board

With the preliminaries out of the way, the Greater Toronto Services Board gets down to business tomorrow.

And as the first business meeting kicks off, many York Region politicians are wondering how long regional governments will last.

Fueling the fire is a new discussion paper from the City of Burlington, which advocates killing Halton Region and replacing it with a co-operative services board.

The board, which would have no policy-making powers or direct taxing abilities, would bring councillors and senior bureaucrats together to administer some services.

Local municipalities would become far more powerful. The GTSB would also evolve over time to take on more authority.

The report, written by city manager Tim Dobbie, said the new governance model would be less confusing for residents, who don't know which level of government to call for services.

It would also be more accountable and provide more efficient services, although the report doesn't estimate how much money would be saved.

Many York Region councillors support the model — although at least one rural mayor said small towns will suffer if it goes through.

"Absolutely, put my name up there (in favour of Burlington's plan)," said Vaughan Mayor Lorna Jackson. She was part of a coalition of mayors who last year demanded the province give the GTSB many of the services regions now provide.

"There are those of us who say we don't need two levels of government doing the same thing. We will always protect
