


SPORTS: No shortage of spring and summer outdoor recreational activities for adults

The emphasis is on having fun

For adults looking to rediscover outdoor sport for the sheer pleasure of it, Stouffville would appear to offer a field of opportunity.

The town boasts numerous recreational leagues for athletes of both sexes for whom the years have served to diminish their keen athletic edge.

With the approach of the spring and summer season, the softball diamonds at memorial park will once again play host to three adult fun softball leagues.

The Monday Night Ladies Softball League offers an outlet for women of all ages looking to combine sport and fun.

"We try to keep it as much fun as possible," said Millie Amos, league president. "We've had girls call and say they've never played ball before. We tell them to just come out and bring a glove."

The league consists of six teams of roughly 15 players. Teams are switched each season, with an eye towards an equal distribution of the seasoned veterans with the raw rookies.

Ages range from the 20s through the 60s, Amos said.

Lillian Cordell, who started the league 25 years ago, is still getting in her swings.

The game is low key. Pitching is lob style, players take turns umpiring and coaches play.

Every effort is made to prevent injuries. Safety bags are used at first base and players are not required to touch home plate to score.

Slightly more competitive is the Tuesday Night Ladies Softball League.

With paid umpires and non-playing coaches for each of the six teams, the pitchers are required to achieve the standard slow pitch arc.

But while standings are kept, with a wrap up tournament held each September, the emphasis is still on fun, president Sandra Murphy said.

"We've had some players come from other leagues because they said they were too competitive," Murphy

said. "I joined the league seven years ago. I had never played the game before."

Murphy said the league is made up of new players, others who haven't played since high school, and former competitive players.

Like their Monday night counterparts, the Tuesday league includes players from all age groups.

"We have some mothers and daughters playing," Murphy said.

Both women's leagues have openings for the upcoming season.

Shifting to the men's side of the diamond, the Monday Night Mens' Lob Pitch League offers a chance for casual players to take to the diamond.

With 12 teams and a waiting list of players eager to join, the league is a haven for slow pitch players looking to ease up the pace, former fast pitch players, and those just looking to combine social contact with sport.

"It started out with Bill Hassard (a Stouffville senior and former Toronto Maple Leaf) and a few others," recalled Jim Brazier, a veteran player coach in the league.

Teams remain together from year to year, with newcomers added when players drop out. Players pitch to their own team mates, with a three-pitch maximum.

There are no umpires and no standings kept, although a championship tournament is held at the end of the season.

"It was very relaxed in the beginning," Brazier noted. "Now it's a younger group and they're a little more competitive."

Recreational soccer players can also get their kicks.

An over-35 league including players from Stouffville and other neighbouring towns takes to the rec centre field Wednesday nights.

Standings are not kept in the six-team loop. However, referees are used and things get a little competitive, said organizer Joe Caldeira, president of the Whitchurch-Stouffville Soccer Club.

"A Monday night pick-up soccer

night, that in the past included men and women players, will be split into two groups this season.

The club is introducing a recreational adult women's program in response to the huge increase in females taking up soccer in Canada. Women players of all ability levels can participate.

The men will form their own casual league, with both groups playing on Monday nights.
