

New head restraint system in Infiniti sedans will help reduce whiplash injuries suffered in rear-end collisions

Nissan plans to launch an active head restraint system for driver and front passenger seats on most Infiniti sedans sold in North America beginning later this year.

Test data on the new technology was presented at an engineering conference in Vancouver, B.C., Feb. 8 to 11.

The system is designed to help reduce the sort of whiplash neck injuries suffered primarily in rear-end collisions.

It is made under license from Lear Corporation and is already standard equipment on three Nissan models sold in Japan — the Cima and Cefiro sedans and the Sunny sub-compact.

It will become standard equipment on model year 2000 Infiniti Q45 and I30 luxury sedans and will be installed on

other Infiniti and Nissan vehicles in future.

Nissan also plans to introduce the active head restraint system in European market vehicles beginning in early 2000.

Whiplash injuries result from sudden misalignment of the neck and head when a vehicle is struck from behind. The body is pushed forward by the seat while the head — if unsupported — fails to move in the same direction.

This kind of force causes the head to snap backwards, stretching and bending the neck.

Nissan's analysis of test data obtained in volunteer medical experiments with a prototype seat, found the active head restraint provides specific benefits to the three primary movements in the neck during rear-end collisions:

- The neck injury criterion value, an index of the severity of the head's backward movement, was reduced by about 65 per cent.

- The backward rotational angle of the head, resulting from retroflexion (backward jolting) of the neck, was reduced by about 35 per cent.

Nissan's active head restraint system mechanically moves the seat's head restraint upward and forward, providing support for the occupant's head. Springs in the seat structure return the headrest to its normal position after the collision.

NISSAN V6 HONOURED

The 3.0-litre, V-6 engine in the Nissan Maxima and Infiniti I30 sedans has been named for the fifth straight year to the Ten Best Engines list compiled by editors at Ward's Communications, Inc., a leading automotive trade publisher.

The Nissan VQ engine is one of only two engines voted to the list every year that editors of Ward's *Auto World* magazine and Ward's *Engine and Vehicle Technology Update* newsletter have named the best engines in vehicles sold in North America.

Nissan's new-generation three-litre VQ engine was introduced in the 1995 Nissan Maxima and the 1996 Infiniti I30. It features microfinishing of camshafts and crankshafts, a digital knock-control system and a cross-flow coolant pattern.

The engine produces more power (190 horsepower) and torque (205 ft/lb), while being more fuel efficient, quieter and smaller than its predecessor, the 3.0-litre VG engine — also regarded as one of the best V6s ever engineered.

"The 3.0-litre VQ is uncategorically delightful," said Bill Visnic, technical editor of *Auto World*. "Five years after its launch, it remains in the opinion of Ward's Best Engine testers, the best V-6 available in the U.S. at any price."

"Being named to this list is a great honour, and being named every year the list has been made is even a greater honour," said Shigeo Ishida, president of Nissan Research and Development, Inc., who accepted this year's award on behalf of Nissan.

This VQ engine, which also is used in Nissan products in Europe and Japan, truly is a world-class engine in world-class cars.

"We are working on expanding the use of VQ engines in the near future, and the results of that work will be showing up soon in North America," he said.

Nissan's North American operations include styling, engineering, manufacturing, sales, consumer and corporate financing, and industrial and textile equipment.
