Prank school call criminal offence

threatened a bomb, hidden somewhere in the school, might explode within the hour.

Terpstra then called the Whitchurch-Stouffville Fire Department, telling them the fire alarm was linked to a bomb threat. Fire Chief Bill Brown arrived and escorted Terpstra around the school.

The police officers, meanwhile were working from their patrol cars and in direct contact with their emergency response unit.

The officers also kept a close watch on the behaviour of students, Sgt. Craig Rogers said.

Finally, the all-clear sign was given. Everyone agreed it was a prank and students returned to class.

"The evacuation took 68 seconds, the fastest we've ever had. The students were out for half an hour," Terpstra said.

A prank bomb threat is a criminal offence and will be treated "very seriously," Terpstra said. "The person responsible should be charged. This is criminal activity."

The emergency response unit is expensive, according to Rogers. The unit is made

up of 11 highly-trained police officers. As well, the ERU has a \$70,000 robot, complete with three cameras and an X-ray device, and is programmed to flush out explosives.

Explosive suits worn by the ERU officers cost \$16,000 each. The ERU has a \$50,000 truck which carries explosive device tools, valued at about \$100,000.

"Our officers are trained to handle hostage and armed incidents. And, five of our officers are trained in explosives. It is very costly operation," Rogers said.

Last year, the ERU responded to 36 calls where there were devices that were explosive or resembled explosive devices, Rogers said.

"We get several hundred (prank) calls from schools a year. The numbers increase around exam time," Rogers said.

The shootings in the U.S. and Alberta schools have influenced students in York Region, he said.

"The kids are picking up on this. Someone threatens to bring a gun to school and terror goes through the school.

An arms threat really upsets things."
