begin in November, he maintained, while acknowledging the screening had already forced the consortium to ask Markham to permit extraordinary hours for the roadwork.

The consortium will ask Markham council today for noise bylaw exemptions allowing work on the road 24 hours a day, except on Sundays, or from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. between Hwy. 48

and a point east of Ninth Line.

The federal screening, conducted by the Department of Fisheries and Oceans, is looking at the road's effect on the Rouge River and other watercourses the highway will cross. It is expected to finish this fall.

A provincial environmental assessment on the extension was completed and approval given without a hearing, before the deal was signed this spring.

Lawsuits, hearings fill years between death and inquest

and outraged the community.

Suleman was wanted by police and a warrant had been issued for his arrest as a suspect in several gunpoint carjackings. Kamadia was trying to arrange for his peaceful surrender but had not seen him for several days leading up to his death.

He failed to show up at least once for a 3 a.m. meeting at Millie's Not Just Donuts, a Steeles Avenue donut shop in Markham, arranged by a friend of his mother's. But the following morning, June 19, just before 3 a.m., police spotted a stolen Jeep Cherokee and suspected Suleman was behind the wheel. They followed it.

Suleman and another teen intended to elude police on foot, stopping the Jeep on Trafaldr Crescent, but before they got out, Wiche was at the driver's door. Suleman put the Jeep in reverse but found that route blocked by a cruiser. He then put the vehicle in drive and accelerated, striking Wiche, who ended up on the Jeep's hood. The gun went off, striking Suleman in the head.

The Special Investigations Unit charged Wiche with manslaughter seven months later.

During his preliminary hearing at Newmarket Provincial Court the following June, Wiche was attacked from behind, stabbed four times in the neck and once in the shoulder, by a young offender known to the Suleman family.

Dozens of people, including Wiche's parents, witnessed the stabbing and watched as he collapsed to the ground. The attack sparked security improvements in the courthouse, including a walk-through metal detector.

The boy, then 15, pleaded guilty to attempted murder and served two years in custody. He is completing a year-long probation.

Wiche's preliminary hearing continued two months later, and the charges were dismissed. Wiche returned to duty.

Wiche has filed a \$6-million suit against the force for lax security at the courthouse. Kamadia has also filed a \$4-million civil suit against Wiche, York Regional Police and 16 other officers for the wrongful death of her son.

Dr. William Lucas, regional coroner for Metro Toronto, will preside over the inquest.

Dr. Peter Clark, regional coroner for Central Ontario, said Lucas was called in to ensure the inquest coroner has no association with those involved.
