

THE REGIONAL MUNICIPALITY OF YORK EXPROPRIATIONS ACT

NOTICE OF APPLICATION FOR APPROVAL TO EXPROPRIATE LAND

IN THE MATTER OF an application by The Regional Municipality of York for approval to expropriate lands and interest in lands described in Schedules "A", "B" and "C" hereto, in the Town of Markham in The Regional Municipality of York, for the purposes of the widening and reconstruction of Kennedy Road (YR 3) from 16th Avenue (YR 73) to Major Mackenzie Drive (YR 25), to a basic width of 36.0 metres with additional widenings at cuts, fills, watercourse crossing and intersections; to provide a basic four-lane road with left-turn and right-turn lanes at intersections.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that application has been made for approval to expropriate the lands and interest in lands described in Schedules "A", "B" and "C" hereto. Any owner of lands in respect of which notice is given who desires an inquiry into whether the taking of such land is fair, sound and reasonably necessary in the achievement of the objectives of the expropriating authority shall so notify the approving authority in writing,

- (a) in the case of a registered owner, served personally or by registered mail within thirty days after the registered owner is served with the notice, or, when the registered owner is served by publication, within thirty days after the first publication of the notice;
- (b) in the case of an owner who is not a registered owner, within thirty days after the first publication of the notice.

Fish spawn in Don

When people think of the Don River, they envision its ugly, muddy and concrete-lined final passage into Lake Ontario.

But at the Don's headwaters in Richmond Hill and Vaughan, its water is clean — fed by springs right out of the toe of the Oak Ridges Moraine — and relatively healthy, said Bernie McIntyre, a fish expert for the Toronto and Region Conservation Authority.

This year, probably for the first time since European settlement, migratory fish are able to reach spawning grounds above Toronto on all three of the city's rivers — the Rouge, the Humber and the Don.

The Atlantic salmon, which made spawning runs back in pioneer days, is long gone. But rainbow trout and chinook salmon, species imported from British Columbia and released in the rivers, are finally in position to do what they once did.

If they can spawn successfully, it will be one of the most exciting comebacks ever staged on the three rivers. "It's an excellent success story," said Jon

Clayton, a TRCA fish biologist.

Reaching the spawning grounds has required years of stocking, annual fish transfers and removal of dams and other obstacles by the TRCA, provincial government and private groups.

The Don, where fish could swim only three kilometres north of the Keating Channel three years ago, has had three barriers removed, the latest this spring at the Donalda Golf Course 18 kilometres upstream. "We think it was the last barrier," McIntyre said this week.

There are still a couple of smaller obstacles between the course and the spawning grounds which may impede the heavier chinook salmon, Clayton said, "but rainbows in particular continue to amaze me with their ability to get around stuff."

To get to Woodbridge on the Humber, spawning rainbows have jumped six or seven barriers and gone over two fishways, he added.

This spring is also the first, Clayton added, when fish can travel up both branches of the Humber in Vaughan, thanks to alterations there.

Clayton will return to the Humber where he noticed signs of spawning
