Stouffville family lucky to escape serious injury

An accident in Uxbridge Sunday claimed the life of an 18-year-old and seriously injured a child, while a Stouffville family escaped with a few cuts and bruises. The fatal collision took place at the intersection of Davis Drive and Regional Road One in Uxbridge.

for Sick Children with life-threatening head injuries, Durham Regional Police say.

The accident occurred when a Malibu, driven by Johnson, was hit by a south-bound GMC pickup, driven by Doug Blizzard, 38, of Stouffville. Blizzard was taken to hospital in Uxbridge along with his two children Jerrifer, 6, and Christine, 8. The Blizzards were treated for minor injuries and released. The Hospital for Sick Children has upgraded Scott's condition from critical to serious. The collision is still under investigation.

DEAD AT SCENE

Daniel Johnson of Cavan was pronounced dead at the scene, while his passenger, Matthew Scott of Newmarket, was taken to hospital in Uxbridge and then airlifted to the Hospital

NOTICE OF FILING OF ADDENDUM CLASS ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT

ST. JOHN'S SIDEROAD (Y.R. 26) YONGE STREET (Y.R. 1) TO WOODBINE AVENUE (Y.R. 8) TOWNS OF AURORA AND WHITCHURCH-STOUFFVILLE

The Regional Municipality of York undertook the Class Environmental Assessment (Class EA) to determine the improvements required to St. John's Sideroad from Yonge Street to Woodbine Avenue. The objective of the study was to accommodate existing and future traffic, due to development, and improve safety for all road users.

A number of planning alternatives were developed, analysed and evaluated based on input from members of the public and government agencies. The project team recommended widening St. John's Sideroad from Yonge Street to Bayview Avenue to provide 4 urban lanes and from Bayview Avenue to Woodbine Avenue to provide 2 standard rural lanes.

The Environmental Study Report (ESR), which documents the planning process, was filed on September 16, 1999. The Minister of the Environment received five (5) bump-up requests and after review determined an Individual Environmental Assessment was not warranted. As a condition of bump-up denial, the Minister directed the Region of York to prepare an Addendum to provide further documentation of the alternative solutions analysis and evaluation followed during the Class EA process. This Addendum should be read with the accompanying ESR. The documentation in this report focuses on the decision making process followed in analysing and evaluating the various alternatives and selecting the preferred solution. In essence, this Addendum provides further clarification with respect to the alternatives identified in the Environmental Study Report (ESR).

This Addendum is now filed on the public record for a period of 30 days ending July 7, 2000. During the filing period, any individual is entitled to request that the project be "bumped up" to an Individual Environmental Assessment relative to the issues addressed in the Addendum. If the identified concerns relative to such issue can not be resolved in consultation with the project team, the written bump up request must be directed to the Minister of the Environment, 135 St. Clair Avenue West, 15th Floor, Toronto, ON M4V 1P5 and copied to the Region of York Clerks Department and must indicate the reasons for the request. Following the filing period, and if no bump up requests are received by the Minister, the project may proceed through to design and construction subject to the receipt of all necessary legislative approvals.

Replica gun leads to arrest of teenager

A 17-year-old is charged after an imitation handgun was waved around outside Keswick Public School in Georgina.

A janitor called police Tuesday afternoon after watching two youths walk past as one of them pointed a replica gun at the school.

As he approached the youths, they ran off, swearing at him.

A short time later, he noticed the same boy go into the Cornerstone Pentecostal Church, which backs onto the school's property.

Police arrested the boy in the church and seized a black plastic gun.

The boy, from Georgina, is charged with one count of weapons dangerous and appears in court July 12.

possess a pill press or any of the chemical elements that go into producing street drugs.

Since only the manufactured form of the chemicals is considered illegal, the investigation took time.

"These are big-time guys but it was a long time coming, since 1998," he said. "They are very good at moving and there's no law against purchasing lab equipment, or the press or the raw chemicals - only the finished product."

He added both Health Canada and the RCMP are lobbying the federal government for stricter regulations in this area.

Four ounces of manufactured ecstasy was seized in the dawn raids along with the raw materials that would be worth between \$5 million and \$8 million on the street in their final form.

"These presses can produce 300 pills a minute," Smith said, or a kilogram a day.

A special environmental hazard team was called in to remove waste left at the farmhouse, a precaution taken routinely by police, Smith said.

"In every case of clandestine labs there are waste products," he said. "They generate six pounds of waste for every pound of product. It's not radioactive or anything, but acids, solvents and catalysts can be irritants."

The eight accused appear in a Toronto court June 14.
