## Centenarian shares birthday with 100

Clara Klages shares a birthday with Canada.

The country is 133. Today, Clara will mark her 100th birthday with 100 of her closest friends and family.

"Her advice was always to keep smiling," said her daughter, Sylvia Limpert, of Richmond Hill.

"She was always known for her smile."

Born on a farm in southwestern Ontario, Clara is the youngest of 16 children. She left the farm in her early teens to work at factories in Kitchener.

Clara has been a resident of the Willows Estate in Aurora since 1992. She loved to play a tune or two for her fellow residents until ill health and diminishing eyesight forced her to give up her two favourite pastimes: music and reading her Bible.

"Church and the Lord have been very important to her," Sylvia said. "And she did her best to make sure her children and grandchildren stayed on the right path."

Today, 93 family members, including 18 grandchildren, 41 great-grandchildren and a few great-great-grandchildren, along with some longtime friends, will gather at a Richmond Hill church to celebrate Clara's adventure-filled life.

Born at the dawn of the new century, Clara has seen many of the world's major historical events. She was a teenager at the start of the First World War, a young homemaker during the Great Depression and she said goodbye to nephews who served in the Second World War.

In the years following her husband's death in 1965, she visited Israel, Hawaii and, at 88, took a cruise on the Panama Canal. Her last trip, at age 92, was to British Columbia to visit her daughter for a winter.

Though she has been plagued by ill health for much of her life, Clara has made the best of each of her days, Sylvia said.

Some however, may find it difficult to adapt to the vision or comfort of mono-vision or bifocal contact lenses.
