### THIS IS YOUR OPPORTUNITY TO BE INVOLVED IN IMPROVING TRANSPORTATION IN YORK REGION

As one of Canada's fastest growing municipalities, York Region is facing a number of transportation challenges. The Region must ensure that its roads, transit services and rail facilities keep pace with the needs of a growing population and expanding businesses. In fact, the Region's population is anticipated to approximately double during the next 30 years. Since several key transportation arteries across the Region are already showing signs of congestion, swift and effective action to improve the movement of people and goods is a top priority.

In response, the Region has initiated two major studies to address the long-term transportation needs of its residents and businesses. The end result will be a transportation strategy that is achievable, economically sustainable and environmentally responsible.

#### Transportation Master Plan

This study will create a long-term transportation vision and plan to guide the development of the Region over the next 30 years, and determine priorities for the short term. It will take into account the movement of both people and goods across the Region, and between the Region and the City of Toronto and other parts of the GTA. In developing the vision and plan, all modes of travel - ranging from walking to public transit to driving - will be examined. In finding solutions to our transportation challenges, economic, environmental and community needs of our Region will be reviewed.

#### Yonge Street Corridor Transitway Study

The Yonge Street Corridor is one of the busiest transportation routes in York Region. Whether in the form of High Occupancy Vehicle lanes, dedicated bus ways or a subway extension, a fast and reliable transit service in this corridor has been identified as an essential transportation improvement in previous studies. The first step in the transitway study is to develop the Terms of Reference, as required under the Individual Environmental Assessment process. Public input is absolutely essential for this process.

The scope and success of these studies depends greatly on public input and participation. The Region will hold public meetings for both projects in Fall 2000 and Winter 2001 to obtain your views on problems, issues and potential solutions.
