

York police help terrorist victims with T-shirt, ball cap sale

The York Region Police Association is doing its part to help victims of the September terrorist attacks in New York City and Washington by selling memorial baseball caps and t-shirts in malls across York Region.

The original goal of the campaign was to raise \$5,000 by selling only to association members and local firefighters.

That amount was raised quickly and people from outside the association became interested in purchasing items.

"We thought it would be good if we could raise \$20,000 in the public," said Kevin Bowen, director of the York Region Police Association.

There was no problem reaching that goal. Just by selling at the Markville Shopping Centre in Markham on Nov. 3 and at the Toronto Police Association Craft show on Nov. 4 that amount has been raised.

They are being sold on Nov. 10 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Upper Canada Mall in Newmarket and on Nov. 16 from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. at Hillcrest Mall in Richmond Hill.

The caps and t-shirts cost \$10 each.

"We have completely exceeded our expectations," said Bowen. "Our goal is now to raise as much as possible."

What that means is that the weight ends up being 12% more than when they started. This is accomplished by using "tumbling machines" which increase product yield (read: more profit) at the expense of product quality. It's what we don't do that makes our bacon so good! So if peameal is on your menu this week, get your knives out, sharpen them up and come and see us, cause your peameal deal is back!
