person shall play or take part in any game or sport upon a roadway." It doesn't mention street hockey specifically.

"I've been here just short of three years and we've yet to get a complaint," he said. "That's how we'd approach it; we don't go out looking for it."

Newmarket no longer sees the need for a bylaw.

"Once we had a bylaw prohibiting any kind of playing on streets," said a bylaw officer, "but that was repealed many years ago."

He insisted, however, that the roadway is not for pedestrians — and that includes street hockey.

The bylaw office in King Township was of the same opinion.

"We have had no complaints (about road hockey) but it seems like a pretty unsafe practice to me," said a bylaw officer who would not give her name. "Parents shouldn't be letting their children play on the road."

Keith Saunders, a bylaw officer in Whitchurch-Stouffville, was a little more forgiving.

"We all did it when we

were kids," he said, admitting that in his native England he played soccer and cricket on the street, not hockey.

"We've had no complaints and I've been here 14 years," he added. "The problem really is when kids go on people's property."

"We have had no complaints (about road hockey) but it seems like a pretty unsafe practice to me. Parents shouldn't be letting their children play on the road."

A bylaw officer in Richmond Hill was asked what the town does if it receives complaints about children playing road hockey. "If we don't have a bylaw, we can't enforce it," she answered.

Markham has no bylaw banning road hockey and "there are no plans for one,"

said Marjorie Rebane, manager of corporate communications.

That's good news for Markham youngsters like Jake Legrice, 9, and his brother, Daniel, 10. The two said Tuesday they play road hockey near their friends' homes in town because they themselves live in a rural area. Daniel admitted that their friends' neighbours sometimes complain to them but "we just keep on playing."

Jake said no one has ever asked the police to stop the action.

Jamie Perry, 11, of Richmond Hill, who plays most of his street hockey outside his grandfather's house in Thornhill, said he has never had any complaints. And grandfather Bill White, who spent years on the Toronto police force, doesn't see anything wrong with it.

"It's a tradition in Canada," said White. "They're playing on side streets, away from traffic. None of our neighbours complain, even if the ball goes on their property. But one thing we do make (the children) do is ask if they can retrieve the ball."
