heated hut, equipment, bait and, in some instances, food.

The cost to rent a hut can vary but, on average, Wegman said it's between \$30 and \$40 a person.

"Renting a hut is a great way to go for beginners," he said.

When going out with youngsters, Wegman suggested pursuing species that can be readily caught close to shore, such as yellow perch.

The only prerequisite for those between 18 and 64 years of age is a residential angling licence.

Although Lake Simcoe's surface is still solidifying, ice fishing is under way on Lake Scugog.

Anglers venture out at first or last light on this shallow lake in search of walleyes along weedline edges and dropoffs.

The Woodland Ponds Fish Farm in Sandford offers weekend ice fishing for rainbow trout.

For those wishing to learn more about the sport, Wegman offers a course at Seneca College's King campus start-

ing today from 7 to 10 p.m. and the same hours in Richmond Hill Feb. 5.

This session is for ice anglers of all levels, especially the consistently unsuccessful ones. Cost is \$35 per person.

Wegman offers an advanced course Jan. 15 and Feb. 19 from 7 to 10 p.m. at the King campus and Feb. 26 in Richmond Hill.

The course includes an ice fishing trip to Lake Simcoe. Cost is \$70.

Using comfortable, heated ice huts, students can fish at their own pace for the entire weekend.

Wegman offers a new program Feb. 26 at Seneca College's King campus, followed by a weekend of ice fishing at Callander Bay on the south shores of Lake Nipissing March 1 to 3.

Students learn fundamentals, including safety and how to read ice conditions, winter habits and habitat of several fish species, an overview of standard fishing techniques, advanced methods that fool fish into striking,

tackle and equipment and conservation.

On ice, students apply what they have learned.

A quick how-to seminar and orientation by Rob Hyatt, owner of Rob's Charters, kicks off the weekend.

Using comfortable, heated ice huts, students can fish at their own pace for the entire weekend.

Wegman will be on hand to answer questions and offer guidance.

Participants supply their own tackle, sleeping bag, pillow, refreshments, food, cooking utensils, personal items and transportation to Callander Bay, about 3-1/2 hours from the King campus.

Once there (and included in your enrolment fee), Rob's Charters supplies insulated four and six-person bungalows, propane heat, stove, lights and barbecue, table and chairs, portable toilet facilities, bunk beds, a fish cleaning hut, drinking water, transportation to and from bungalows, lines and holes.

Live bait and fish cleaning are available at a nominal cost.

Cost is \$195. Enrolment is limited.

Sixteenth Avenue Regional Trunk Sewer - Phase 2
Class Environmental Assessment

NOTICE OF COMPLETION

York Region is currently constructing trunk sewers along Ninth Line and Sixteenth Avenue in order to upgrade the York-Durham Sewage System (YDSS) to meet the long-term needs of the Region. York Region is now commencing the implementation stages for Phase 2 of the Sixteenth Avenue trunk sewer between Stone Mason Drive to just east of Woodbine Avenue. The Phase 2 of the trunk sewer will consist of a 7.1 km long sewer approximately 2.6 m in diameter, which will also be constructed primarily by tunnelling. Due to the overall length of the tunnel, intermediate mining shafts will be required along with three sewer drop shafts.

York Region prepared an environmental study which discusses the proposed undertaking. The study follows the requirements of the provincial Class Environmental Assessment procedures. By this Notice of Completion the environmental study is being placed on the public record for review in accordance with the requirements of the Municipal Class Environmental Assessment. Subject to comments being received on this project, York Region intends to proceed with this project in the winter of 2002.

"Bump-up" requests must be received by the Minister at the address below by 11th February, 2002. A copy of the "bump-up" request shall be sent to the Clerk of York Region. If no "bump-up" request is received by 11th February, 2002, York Region intends to proceed with construction as outlined in the Class EA.

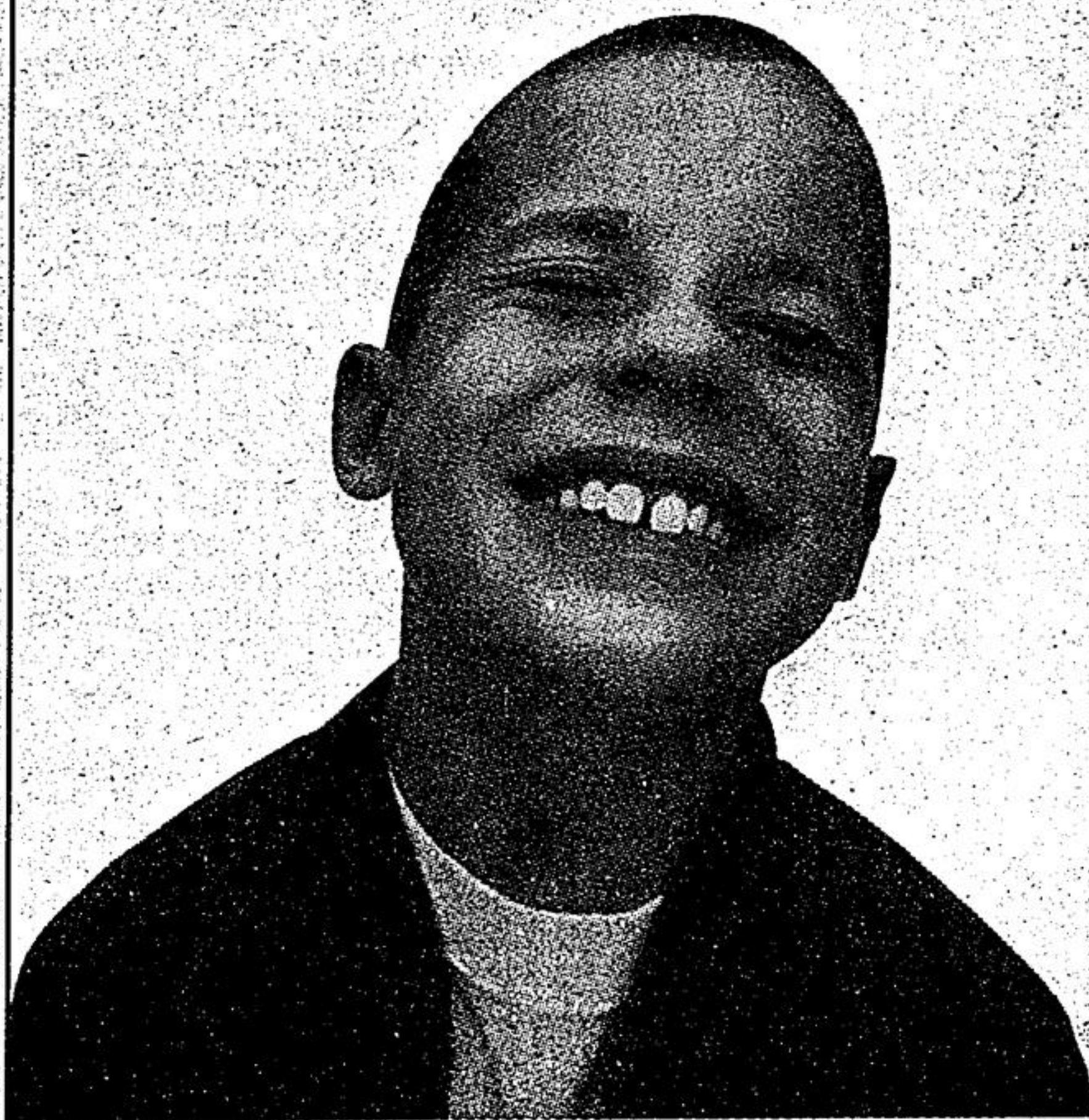

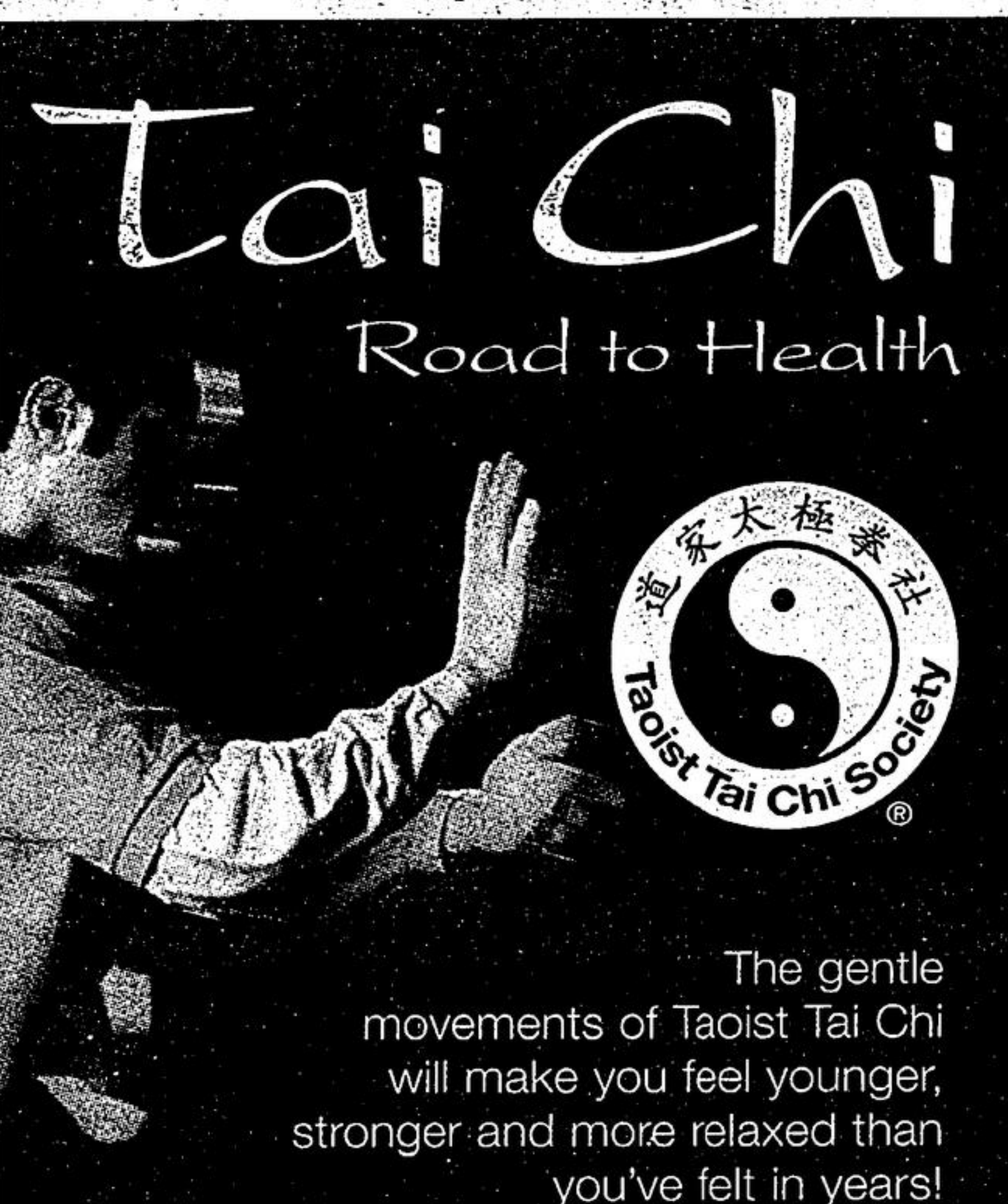
