

Waxers lose scoring touch

Rangers take 2-1 lead in junior series;
Game 5 tonight at Markham Centennial

During the regular season, scoring goals wasn't that difficult a task for the Markham Waxers.

But at the same time they had a penchant for surrendering a few more than what head coach Russ Herrington would have preferred.

With the Provincial Junior A Hockey League playoff series now in full swing, the Waxers have reduced their goals against in their first-round, best-of-seven series against the North York Rangers, allowing just seven goals in the first three games.

At the other end, the Waxers also picked a bad time to go into a goal-scoring famine as they dropped a 3-1 decision to the Rangers in the third game at North York on Wednesday and trail the series two games to one.

Steve Nobili scored the lone goal for the Waxers just 19 seconds after the Rangers took a 1-0 lead in the second period. The Rangers scored the eventual winning goal before the period concluded and added an insurance marker in the third.

If the scoring drought continues this weekend after hosting yesterday's fourth game, and tonight's fifth game at Centennial Arena starting at 8:30 p.m., the Waxers might be taking an earlier-than-expected summer vacation.

"During the regular season we paid the price to get those goals. We're not doing that now," said a dejected Herrington after Wednesday's loss.

Among the sacrifices not being made was the lack of traffic placed in front of Rangers' goalie Kenny Grad, who has been good when called upon.


The Waxers' power play has also been inconspicuously absent as they've scored just once in the first three games.

The Waxers must also find a way to get their top scorer, Jesse Boucher, back in sync. A 51-goal scorer during the regular season, Boucher has been held in close check by the Rangers in the first three games.

"What we need is some accountability and some pride," assessed Herrington. "We're playing without both of these things right now."

About the only bright spot so far in the series has been the work of goalies B.J. VanMierlo, who played well in Wednesday's loss, and Chris Lawrence.

"I feel sorry for our goalies," said Herrington. "They've been showing up and maybe about three other guys. North York has 23 guys showing up to play and that's been the difference."

The Collingwood Blues dominated the Spirit for most of the Provincial Junior A Hockey League playoff game and held on for a 5-4 win.

Heading into last night's game in Collingwood, the Blues led the best-of-seven North Conference quarterfinal two games to one.
