

Time for province to strengthen animal cruelty laws

The press release read, "Just as the Ontario Society for Prevention to Cruelty to Animal staff administered examinations and grooming to 34 dogs rescued from a farm near Alliston, another 24 dogs from the same farm arrived at the Whitchurch-Stouffville-based animal centre."

This was not a once-in-a-lifetime event. Last summer, a story published in York Region newspapers read, "An endless stream of quivering, anxious little dogs entered the small grooming room."

Most submitted to brushing, clipping and bathing with nary a whimper, too scared to resist. Many shivered violently, some defecated as we held them in our arms."

This press release focused on the needs of the 180 dogs rescued from a Vaughan farm.

Such a sad story not only reminded us of people's inhumanity towards people, but our inhumanity towards puppies.

Some dogs from the Vaughan puppy mill raid were too sick to help and had to be put down.

After a great deal of work, skill and tender loving care, the good people at the OSPCA were able to return most of the puppies to reasonable health.

When word spread that 180 little dogs had landed on the doorstep of the just-opened OSPCA headquarters, the public rallied. People arrived at the Woodbine Avenue shelter and lined up to donate cash, dog food, blankets and to fill out adoption applications.

The jury is no longer out: For the most part, people care about each other and about the well being of animals.

It's also obvious that existing laws regarding cruelty to animals aren't doing the job.

Since the OSPCA saw fit to put its anchor down in our backyard, residents across the region seem to rise to the occasion to share the responsibility.

As a community, let's stand up for the dogs once again. We're not only being asked to help by making financial donations and adopting the 54 shelties,

cockapoos and terriers; we can also help lobby the provincial government to toughen existing laws linked to abuse in animals.

No doubt, we all agree: Those responsible for the abuse must be made accountable.

If, as recommended, they are adopted, amendments to the federal government's Bill C-15B will accomplish the following:

- make it an offense to brutally or viciously kill any animals;

- make it an offense to abandon or fail to provide suitable and adequate food, water, air, shelter and care for an animal;

- remove animal cruelty from the property crimes section of the Criminal Code recognizing animals are living beings that feel pain;

- toughen penalties for convictions of animal cruelty by increasing the existing \$2,000 fine to an unlimited amount to be determined by a judge;

- increasing jail time from six months to five years.

Since Bill C-15B is up for third reading in the House of Commons, it will be passed soon.

While former Minister of Justice Anne McLellan has shown leadership in urging her government to put some teeth in existing animal cruelty laws, the Ontario government has basically sat idle, stalling on real and meaningful amendments to the OSPCA Act which would greatly help investigations.

Join me in appealing to MPPs across York Region to strengthen the laws linked to animal cruelty.

In the light of the latest puppy mill raid, an immediate provincial governmental response is in order. Keep in mind, last summer, the OSPCA removed more than 500 dogs from puppy-mills.
