

Treat bullying reports seriously: student

"Sometimes, someone might tell on someone just because they don't like them," said Sakina, a Grade 5 pupil.

"It depends what's going on," said Andrew from Grade 6. "If someone is bugging you I understand, but you should try to stop it yourself."

Candace, a Grade 8 student, highlighted Dr. DiPasquale's admonition that adults have to listen.

"If you tell and it's not a big deal, what's the point?" she asked.

All six either had been bullied at sometime or knew of bullies.

Grade 8 student Helen said she was bullied verbally when she first came to the school and Andrew said he had been taunted and made fun of.

Joanna, a tiny Grade 4 student, said other children teased her about the food she ate.

"It makes me feel bad," she said.

Matt, in Grade 7, said he knew a bully but "he didn't do anything to me. I didn't tell but if it got worse I would have."

Candace told of a boy in her class who was bullied by isolation.

"He's not liked very much," she said. "He doesn't get included. All he does is read. He's sensitive and people tease him. Will it change? I don't know."

After Dr. DiPasquale's opening, students were allowed to select which two workshops they wanted to attend.

Jay Solomon told the students in his workshop he remembered what it was like to be bullied, but admitted he didn't have the answers to bullying.

He asked the children if they had heard about the Abbotsford, B.C., schoolgirl who committed suicide recently because she could no longer bear to be bullied. All the students knew the story.

"If that isn't the saddest case I've heard about, I don't know what is," said Mr. Solomon.

For principal Ruth Lambert, sadness also entered the picture.

"In some ways it's a sad commentary on the community at large that we need to have this conference," she said.

Planning for the day-long workshop started two years ago and cost \$10,000, said Ms Lambert, the money derived from school fundraising projects.

"I strongly believe the best way to deal with bullying is to educate the children from Kindergarten to Grade 8," she said.

Although Ms Lambert insisted Doncrest does not have a lot of bullying, she said planning for the conference began when staff noticed an increase in detentions and suspensions.

Since then, the school has reduced negative behaviour by monitoring halls, introducing character education and tabling guidance periods into every grade to focus on anti-bullying.

"Most children feel confident now talking about bullying," she said. "We'll judge the success of the program by the number of children willing to talk."
